Jackie Matthews: Thanks for the Memories

For Jackie Matthews, the last 15 years as caddymaster at North American championships has produced "memories of a lot of kids and a lot of families.

"I see pictures of grandkids now," says Matthews. "When they're ready to caddy, I'll quit."

Matthews, a tournament director from Sacramento CA, worked her first NABC as caddymaster at the 1986 Spring tournament in Portland. She sees her role as "firm but motherly – I want my kids to be well behaved in the (playing) area but

still have time to be kids."

The Caddy Corps here in Birmingham has been an extremely diverse group: members of the Convention Center family, a senior group, Matthews' traveling group – "they're sure I put on a 10-day party just for them," says Matthews – and a small group of more experienced caddies.

The last group includes Bernice Gee of Regina SK, whose husband Ken is one of Canada's top professional players, and Elaine Ware of

Close behind, with 117 VPs, are Simon Kantor, Jim Robison, Linda Lewis and Mark Itabashi.

An all-Austrian team is third with 115.50. Team members are Gerhard Schiesser, Sascher Wernle, Arno Lindermann, Bernel Saurer, Andreas Babsch and Martin Schifko.

2000 Player of Year still up in the air

The 2000 Player of the Year is definitely up in the air as the result of yesterday's upsets in the Reisinger. Zia, leading with just the Reisinger to go, still may prove to be the winner, but only if both Lew Stansby and Robert Levin do poorly in the Reisinger final. Zia and Jeff Meckstroth, running 1-2 after the Blue Ribbon, both failed to make the Reisinger final.

The only points that count in this race are those won in North American championships – platinum points.

John Mohan, last year's Player of the Year, is not in the running this year although he has amassed 407 points.

The following list has been compiled by the Daily Bulletin staff and therefore is not official. Section awards were not available and were not included.

According to our calculations, these players have earned more than 350 platinum points this year, with all events counted through Thursday's Blue Ribbon Pairs.

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Missing the point of the board

Although the entry for the Reisinger event was well down in size from 1999 Boston, the field was strong, containing a wealth of world, European and North American champions. As an aside, one way to increase the number of entries would be to allow non-qualifiers to drop into the North American Swiss Teams with an assigned score – a method that has worked very well for a number of years at major events in Great Britain.

In what is surely the toughest short teams event in the world, defensive skill is at a premium. Several players missed opportunities of varying degrees of difficulty during the second session of the qualifying round.

This was what Sherlock Holmes might have called a three-pipe problem:

Many players overcalled only 3♥ with the West cards, but that is a very conservative view. Partner may fail to raise when he has what you need for game.

North led the ♣Q, and South took the first two tricks. The switch to the ♠10 was taken by the ace, and declarer drew trumps and played a spade, endplaying North. East's worthless looking dummy was suddenly back in the game.

Should South have found the winning defense of a third round of clubs, a play that would have set up North's $\mathbf{\nabla}Q$?


The next one is considerably easier, but once again South was not up to the task.

When North led a trump, it should not be too difficult for South to withhold the queen, but where he put it up declarer had an easy route to 12 tricks. The trump 8 becomes an entry to the spades.

The final example is somewhere between the two previous ones, and is perhaps more about philosophy than anything else.

Caddies no more - now they're players

Two Knoxville TN brothers, who've caddied at the last five Gatlinburg regionals, have turned their sights to playing here at the NABC.

Jared Fournier, 16, and Jeremy Fournier, 13, are playing – knockouts, Swiss teams, pair games – with their dad, Bob, and family friend Paul Anderberg of Crossville TN.

So what's it like to go from caddying to playing? "It feels good," said Jeremy.

Does he call "Caddy, please?" He shakes his head no. "Just 'caddy' is enough."

What was the hardest part about being a caddy? Jared thought a moment. "Players hide the pick-up slips," he said, "under the boards, under the mats."

The brothers decided about a year ago they were ready to learn bridge. They enlisted their dad, an ACBL accredited teacher, and began playing locally. Their first regional was in Atlanta over Labor Day and this is their first NABC.

Their mom came along for the Birmingham trip but she's not a bridge player. "She's back at the campgrounds," said Bob, "enjoying her quiet time."

Jared and Jeremy will go back to Gatlinburg this spring as caddies – both are Preferred Caddies in District 7 – but then hope to play more.

When South led the Φ Q, Jean-Paul Meyer of France, the declarer, had nine tricks. On a heart lead, that total can be reduced to four if North finds a club switch while he still has a heart entry left.

Our teammates, Richard Margolis and Phillip Alder passed all these tests to record three winning boards. Would yours have done so?

Who has the queen?

In the second session of the Reisinger, the following declarer play problem arose. What would you have done?

West leads the ♥K. After winning with the ♥A, you run the ♠Q, which wins. You continue with a trump to the king and ace, East pitching a club. You call for the ♥J and East plays low. Do you ruff or discard? Why?



Lesson Hand

When an expert of any level plays with her son (daughter, husband, significant other), there is always a certain amount of tension. Any mistake you make is a mortal insult: how dare you play less than your best when playing with them. Any mistake they make is a sad reflection on you: you should have told them what a bid means, how to play a suit combination, what card to play on defense. With that in mind let me offer a hand which might have been a lesson, but the tension from discussing it at the time would have become too great.

Here is Board 28 from the first session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs:



At our table the auction went as shown and East ended up declaring $3 \clubsuit$. South led the $\clubsuit 10$ to declarer's king, then won the $\clubsuit K$ with the ace. He shifted to the $\blacktriangledown 10$ to North's queen and North shifted back to the $\clubsuit Q$ which dummy won with the ace. East now drew trumps and eventually lost two diamonds and a club for down one. Not a bad score since N-S are cold for +140 in $3 \blacktriangledown$. But it could have been better.

The information was there to enable declarer to make 3♠. North clearly has five (or six) hearts, a better than minimum hand for the game try and probably four clubs. If South had four spades he probably would have led hearts to try for the tap rather than a club. So spades are almost certainly 3-2. All of which suggests that North has the ♠A and that it is not with length. So declarer had to use both of the precious entries to dummy to lead diamonds twice toward the king-jack and make the ♠A fall on air. We got up from the table and noted that minus 50 was better than minus 140.

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Senior moments



John Solodar gave me two deals from the Weissmann team's loss to Bennett in the Senior Knockout Teams. The first involved an interesting guess.

You get the ♥10 lead, and you elect to duck when East encourages. You win the heart continuation and finesse in diamonds to pitch a low heart. Next eliminate the diamonds before leading the ♠J. West adroitly hops up with the ace to return the suit. Solodar took the 9, noting the 2-2 split. He led a low club to the jack and king, and back came the ♣9. Should he rise with the 10 or duck, playing East for an original queen doubleton? Solodar (South) got it right when he rose with the 10 -West had indeed started life with king-queen-sixth of clubs.

However, the match hinged on the following deal – and Solodar was full of praise for his opponents here.



In the other room the Bennett team had collected a comfortable 650 on the N/S cards. Things got a little more dramatic in the first room. This was how it started: West North East South

1 💠 **1**♦ 1♥ 4♦ 4♥

Solodar was all set to jump to slam – and his jump to 6♣ was converted to 6♥ by Judy Weissman. Consider the play to 6♥ on a diamond lead. With the ♠A-Q wrong it looks as though Solodar has no chance, but the dummy reversal will yield the extra trick.

Ruff the diamond and lead a club to the 10. Then ruff a diamond, a trump to dummy and another diamond ruff. Cash your high heart and go to the ♣A to draw trumps. Then two of the spades go on the fourth and fifth clubs – contract made!

That was all well and good, but Hayden as East put a spanner in the works by bidding 4♠ as East at his second turn!

Solodar still jumped to 6♣, and now Robison did well not to sacrifice at once or later against 6♥, the final contract. Of course he led a spade now, and that spelled curtains at once.


Note that since the margin in the match was only 14 IMPs, they needed to set the hand to win the match! Even the sacrifice would have turned the match – it cost 800, and the 4-IMP pickup would have left Weissmann the winner by 3 IMPs.



Down four is good bridge

Ivar Stakgold and I had an amusing round in the final of the two-day Open Board-a-Match Teams event Monday evening. On Board 1 Sweden's Peter Fredin overcalled Stakgold's opening weak notrump opening with 2♠. Everyone passed and I led a heart. This was the deal:



Stakgold won the jack and switched to a trump. Fredin ducked a diamond, won the trump return, drew trump, and ducked another diamond, forcing Stakgold's ace. He played a heart to my king and I exited with a small club. Peter now had a guess with nothing to go on and likely a full board at stake. Stakgold had shown up with exactly 10 HCP outside the club suit and either club honor would put him in our 12-14 range. Eventually Fredin misguessed, and +200 was good enough to win the board.

Andrew Moss opened with 1♣ as West in third seat and Stakgold overcalled 1NT. Fredin doubled and in spite of our sound style I thought that my best course was to run. While I think 2♣ should be natural here, Stakgold and I had never discussed it, so I hoped he'd take it as a cuebid asking for his longest suit. Unfortunately Stakgold also decided that the bid should be natu-


Moss led a club and I won and cashed the ♠AK before the rats got at them. I next drew trump and took no more tricks. Perhaps I should have done as Steve Beatty did. In his match he passed the double and his LHO ran to $2\clubsuit$.

At the other table in our match my opponents managed to reach their 4-4 heart fit after their strong notrump was doubled. Our teammates Dan Morse and Bobby Wolff doubled this and by drawing trump beat it 500 to win the board. Note that 3NT will be set after a heart lead, a spade lead and a heart shift, or even a diamond lead. Declarer has nine tricks, but no way to untangle them.

Matchpoint Doubles

Stelio Di Bello, aged 20, is (like his Italian ebridge Junior team associates, brother Furio and Bernardo Biondo) already a European and World Junior champion. He is the youngest professional member of Team Lavazza in Italy, enjoying partnerships with different members of the reigning world championship team.

Here in Birmingham he partnered e-bridge CEO, Pinhas Romik. In the second qualifying session they encountered the defending champions, Jill Meyers and John Mohan, both members of the e-bridge team that won the Transnational Mixed Teams in Maastricht.



Lead: ♥K

Over Jill's conventional heart raise Stelio competed with 2♠. Although John's 3♣ was ostensibly a help-suit game try, it is likely that he was hoping to sound stronger than he was and steal the hand at 3♥. Whatever John's intentions might have been, it all went well for him when Jill signed off in 3♥.

Pinhas felt certain that E/W could make 3♥ (they couldn't, but only if the defense were very sharp) and so competed to 3♠. His main hope was that 3\(\rightarrow\) could not be defeated, but his instincts told him that it was more likely that 3♠ would fail. That would be fine if no one doubled, because minus 100 would produce a better matchpoint score than minus 140, but he was well aware that he was putting his side at risk by bidding three-over-three, vulnerable.

Jill was in no doubt about the number she wanted to enter in her scorecard, and she doubled 3♠ to increase her chances of getting it. John led the ♥K and Stelio simply couldn't avoid the loss of two hearts, one diamond and two clubs, for one down.

Minus 200 was the proverbial kiss of death for the intrepid Israeli and his young partner.

Plus 200, in contrast, made Jill and John a pair of happy defenders.

Jackie Matthews

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Vernon BC, whose husband Martin is an ACBL tournament director and part of the NABC support staff. Then there's Donna and Dick Palmer of Albuquerque NM, a retired couple who've found a second career as NABC caddies. This group has handled most of the training for up to 10 new caddies each day.

Lynnette Ross and Isaac Fair, both of Birmingham, are first-time caddies. "It's fun," said Lynnette. "Before the tournament, I didn't know there was such a thing as bridge. My godmother works for the convention center and they put out a call for help with the tournament."

Isaac agrees that caddying has been fun and adds, "Yeah, I'd do it again sometime."

Rhonda Johnson and Sid Hilton are almost local -- they have driven 100 miles roundtrip each day to caddy. Rhonda has worked on all three floors but prefers the first floor (NABC+ events) – "down there with the big boys."

Matthews has special praise for Barbara Harmon, who worked to secure caddies locally. "She gathered up some wonderful caddies for this tournament. She did a really good job of finding responsible caddies."

There aren't many caddy rules: be neat and tidy and wear comfortable shoes – "they work out the comfortable shoes after the first session," says Matthews.

Matthews and her caddies enjoy their feeling of being family, but they're not as comfortable with the players. Here are two suggestions on how players can help caddies:

* In a team game, when you want boards to be moved, call "Caddy, please" and hold up boards in your hand. "We take a lot of director calls when players just hold up their hands," explained Matthews.

* In pair games, don't hide the pick-up slips from the caddies. Folding them over at the corner "makes it easier for us to pick up."

If players will follow these suggestions, Matthews says one of her dreams just might come true: "Just one tournament, I'd like to hear the kids saying how nice the players are."

As you can see, the winning play is to ruff the heart, dropping the queen. Then you can enter the dummy with a trump to the 7 and rack up two doubled overtricks. Yet why is this the right play?

Well, apart from its being slightly more likely if West has a reasonable double (defensive hand, rather than 2-1-6-4 with respectable offense), there is a key inference – assuming you trust West to defend correctly.

If West has led a singleton ♥K, he must cover the ♠Q at trick two. Then you cannot draw trumps staying in the dummy, ruff out East's ♥Q and get back to the dummy.

Chairpersons

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joined the push and Birmingham was approved by the ACBL Board of Directors. "We are very grateful to (former ACBL CEO) Roy Green for his support," said Hall who became NABC chairman.

"We knew we had a great facility in the convention center," he continued, "but we knew from the get-go that we were going to have a problem with getting people to restaurants."

The buses and e-shuttle solved most of the problems. "I think the average player has really enjoyed the NABC," said co-chair Ann West. "They've enjoyed the music and food. I've had a lot of people tell me how great the caddies have been."

The Visitors and Convention Bureau has been "tremendously supportive," Hall said, and volunteers have come from the local unit, local organizations – such as the Convention Center family – and other units, such as the Unit 232 (North Alabama Bridge Association -- Huntsville). "Huntsville kicked in \$1 per table for four years," said Hall, "and it kind of shamed us into doing the same thing."

In addition, District 10 ran a STaC every year – and proceeds went to the Birmingham NABC Hospitality Fund. This helped provide hospitality every night – and breakfast every morning. "I can't say enough about our volunteers," said Hall. "Their attitude has been 'what else can I do?' We couldn't have done it alone."

Would you do it again? "I have two sons," replied Hall. "Andrew is 8 and William is 5 – maybe when they're in college."

At the table

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Joanne asked for OKbridge for Christmas. She played online with another San Francisco resident who suggested that they meet and play at a local club. "I met her there," says Joanne, "and she showed me how bid boxes work and we came in first that night."

Robert became interested about four months ago. He set up a second computer at the couple's home so they could take lessons on-line together. Their teacher is Mike Moss of Los Angeles. In addition, each has an on-line mentor.

They went to the Summer NABC in Anaheim and had such a good time that they decided to come to Birmingham. "The directors are so nice and it's really run so well," said Joanne.

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
Tournament Appeals

In order to keep the bridge public informed of appeals results in a timely fashion the NABC Daily Bulletin staff publishes write-ups. Every effort is made to ensure that these reports are accurate and complete. However, before they are published in the NABC Appeals Casebook revisions may be made.

Appeals Case #7

Subject: Misinformation

Event: Flight B/C Swiss Teams, 19 Novem-



- (1) Not Alerted; intended as support.
- (2) Intended as a diamond raise.

The Facts: 3♣ went down one, +100 for N/S. The opening lead was the ♦4. After the final pass North told the table that he had failed to Alert his partner's double of 2♦. He realized his error after East had asked to see his convention card. Away from the table, East told the Director that he wouldn't change his call. West said, away from the table, that he didn't care what the double was. East knew South's double wasn't penalty and didn't call the Director to adjudicate. He was willing to guess wrongly what his partner's 3♣ bid was. The Director allowed the table result to stand (Law 9B1a).

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. After the hand was over West said he did not care what the double was, unless it was penalty. He thought it was takeout. When it was pointed out that a support double is a form of takeout, he said he would have bid 3♠ if he had been Alerted. West was asked what kind of vulnerable versus nonvulnerable overcalls his partner made if this were a penalty double. He replied that sometimes he overcalled four-card suits.

East stated that KJ9xx (the suit he held) was kind of on the weak side for a two-level overcall. East also said that since there had been no Alert, he thought his partner was making a runout bid and he had to respect it. When he was asked why he did not protect himself by calling the Director prior to passing 3♣ (when he knew South's double was not penalty) he just repeated his statement about honoring partner's runout. South said that after the Director left the table, West lit into East for not recognizing his cuebid in support of diamonds.

The Panel Decision: West was aware when he bid 3♣ that the double was not penalty. East saw the card was marked support double so he knew it was not penalty. Since East chose to bid on without calling the Director, he was entitled to the score he earned. Since both players knew what was going on, there was no violation of Law 40C. The table result was allowed to stand. The Panel found that the appeal lacked merit, but decided to educate the players rather than assess an appeal without merit warning.

DIC of Event: Ron Johnston

The Facts: 4♠ doubled went down one, +100 for N/S. The opening lead was the ♣J. The Director was called after the double of 4♠ and was told that North had hesitated 5-6 seconds before passing 1NT. N/S denied any hesitation. The Director ruled that there had been no unmistakable hesitation and allowed the table result to stand.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling. The E/W team captain (George Jacobs) attended the hearing. E/W claimed that a hesitation of approximately 5-6 seconds occurred after the 1NT call and that South's double might have been suggested by the hesitation. North said there was no reason for him to hesitate holding only four points vulnerable, with his partner not showing any values. He thought he had taken 2-3 seconds to bid over 1NT. N/S explained that at a previous regional, the Director had been called to the table because they had bid too quickly. The Director had suggested they hesitate briefly before each bid. N/S pointed out that this was a BAM event, and risking the double at BAM was a good gamble with South's holding even if partner could not contribute to the defense, especially since, although East had shown extra values, West had rejected two game tries by East.

The Committee Decision: The question of the hesitation was discussed fully, and the Committee found no reason to find that there had been a hesitation by North. Therefore no infraction had occurred and there was no restriction on any action that South chose. The Committee also decided that this appeal was without substantial merit, and should not have come to Committee. East, West and the team captain were issued an appeal without merit warning.

The Facts: 5♠ made six, +680 for E/W. The Director was called when East bid 4♠. There was at least a 20-second hesitation before West doubled 4♠. East did not bid 4♠ over 4♠ in case West wanted to cuebid hearts. He bid 4♠ over the slow double because he believed North wanted to play 4♠ doubled. He also knew that West could not be doubling with trumps. The Director ruled that East was allowed to believe his partner held the suits she had promised with her takeout double and that pass was not a logical alternative. The table result was allowed to stand.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. North did not attend the hearing. East stated that he had shown his spades when he doubled 3♠ and that he did not have any real values to suggest that 4♠ would be successful. He also wanted to give his partner the opportunity to cuebid hearts. South said he thought the out-of- tempo double suggested doubt and that pass was a logical alternative to 4♠.

The Committee Decision: The Committee discussed the bridge logic of the East hand. The double of 3♠ adequately described the hand and exposed the psychic. The 4♠ bid by North allowed East to get more information since partner might just pass with a minimum, bid 4♠, or bid 4♥. The reopening double showed better than minimum values and offered a choice to defend or bid 4♠. The Committee decided defending was not an option and that 4♠ was clearly the bid required by bridge logic. The Committee believed that N/S should have known that their psychic had been exposed and that after seeing the East hand should not have appealed the Director's ruling. North and South each received an appeal without merit warning.




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A great play



By my calculations, virtually the entire field sitting in the North seat was dealt an early Thanksgiving present – the opportunity to get their names in the *Daily Bulletin* by making a great play. Since the lucky and successful declarers earned 59 of 64 matchpoints, I assume most of them were prepared to put off celebrating until Thursday. Mike Schneider (playing with Erik Secan) took his chance.



On a normal heart lead to the king and a spade shift, declarer had a raw blueprint on the hand. Where there are six tricks, there are often seven, then eight and finally nine.

Declarer won the ♠K and led a low club to the jack and queen, took the spade return and cashed the ♠A K. Now came the key play: declarer cashed the ♠A and exited with his fourth club, to reach this ending:



East, forced to win the $\clubsuit 10$, was endplayed into returning the $\blacktriangledown A$ and another heart.

Schneider won his ♥Q and cashed the last club, squeezing West in spades and diamonds.

So far so good -- indeed the board was reported in the Daily Bulletin as having been played this way by Jim Krekorian.

But note that if the $\blacklozenge Q$ or $\blacklozenge J$ does not appear, declarer can make the same play to develop an extra heart trick but East can defeat the contract by not cashing the $\blacktriangledown A$ before exiting with a low heart. Now the count is not rectified and West can escape the squeeze.



Points in the play

Most of the field opened the North hand (why?) in the first final session of the Open/Women's Board-a-Match Teams and reached the obvious 3NT contract – which made 90% of the time it was attempted by North.




At our table, the auction went: $1 \blacklozenge -1 \blacktriangledown$; $2 \clubsuit -2 \spadesuit$; 2NT-3NT.

Declarer's best play on the ♠6 lead is to hop up with dummy's queen; whether it holds or loses to the ace, the defense is likely to continue attacking spades.

Our declarer made what in practice, if not in theory, was a slight slip and was severely punished. He played low from dummy and trick one and Jeff Blond (West) put in the \$10 to force the jack.

Now declarer led a club to the ace and I took the opportunity to signal with the $\clubsuit6$ – Reverse Smith – asking for a diamond shift. Jeff obediently led the $\spadesuit5$ to the queen and king, and I went back to spades. Jeff took the $\spadesuit A$ and reverted to diamonds – hey, presto, down one!

To compensate for that, there was a subtle point on board 11 that escaped us and it allowed a non-vulnerable game to come home.



Our opponents reached 3NT by South (Pass–1♣; 1NT–3NT) and West led the ♠10 to the jack and queen.

Martin Caley

Teel, Caley top 10,000

Jane Teel of Rockford AL and Martin Caley of Toronto have each reached the 10,000-masterpoint milestone, joining 245 other ACBL players.

Teel, who has been playing for more than 30 years, remembers the earlier days of playing where her goal was to hit average. "I was just determined to learn to play," she said.

She has won more than 100 regional titles, many with husband Bob, who reached the 10,000-point mark a few years ago.

Caley, a professional player and teacher, is a two-time winner of the Richmond Trophy, awarded to the Canadian player who wins the most masterpoints in one year. He is #5 on this year's Richmond list and #2 on the list of all-time Canadian masterpoint winners.

What now for the defense?

It looks obvious to play a second spade but consider partner's problem. With a useless hand outside the spade suit, it will look very tempting for him to duck – after all, declarer could be 2–2–4–5. Now declarer has a trick and the tempo and needs only a good guess in hearts to fetch nine tricks.

Ron Smith duly brought home plus 400 by making the avoidance play of a diamond to his queen, followed by a heart to dummy's 10. He must have been disappointed to discover that since his teammates had gone for minus 800 (in notrump on the East-West cards!), his effort counted for nothing.

Correct defense by East is to shift to a heart at trick two. Whether or not partner has a heart honor, the defense can get the heart suit going – and more importantly, you can ensure that partner does not duck the ♠A at his first time, to facilitate the defense.

May the force be with you

If you consistently find the best lead, you will always be in contention for first place in every event you play. Try this one, where you have the South cards:



To defeat the contract you must lead a diamond. Declarer will ruff, cash a top heart, ruff a heart and finesse in clubs. You win and play the ◆K, forcing declarer for the second time. He can ruff, and try playing hearts, tempting you to ruff, but provided you get rid of your spades first, declarer cannot prevail.

Should you find a diamond lead?

With a virtually certain trump trick, you only need a little help from partner. If you accept that they are most unlikely to hold the $\triangle A$, then playing partner for the $\triangle Q$ rather than $\triangle KQ$ is easily the best bet. The principle is to play partner for the least that is necessary to defeat the contract.

North, taking a pre-Thanksgiving doze, contributed the ◆2. The rest is silence. Minus 550 did not exactly enhance the North-South score.
