

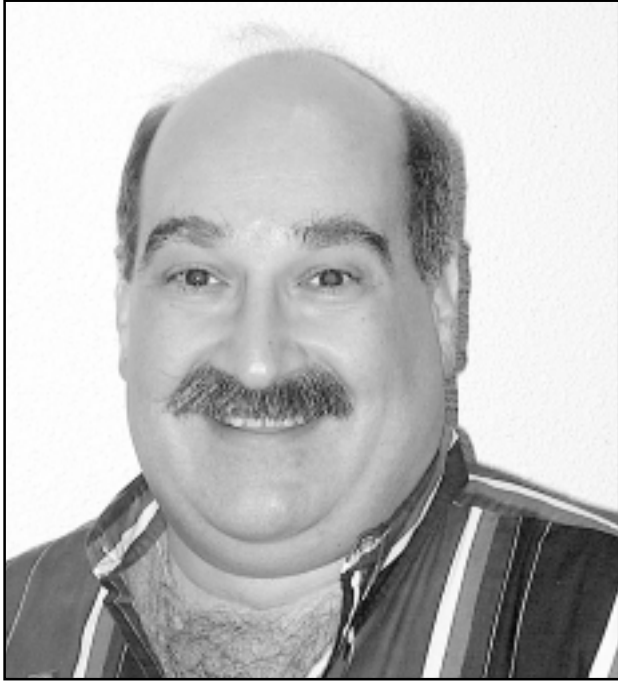

Don Mamula heads Board of Governors

Donald Mamula of Mill Creek WA was elected chairman of the Board of Governors at last Sunday's meeting of the Board. He will succeed Chris Pisarra in January. He has been vice chairman for the past three years. Darwin Afdahl will be the vice chairman.

"I'm not even the best player in my little town of Mill Creek," said Mamula. That's not false modesty – Paul Soloway also lives in Mill Creek.

"We have 137 members on our Board, and I want to tap that experience base," said Mamula. "I want to establish parallel committees with the Board of Directors so that we can cover the same subject areas. I want the two groups to exchange information and views before the Board of Directors meet so that everything won't be coming to the Governors meeting as material that is entirely new to us.

"I've talked with Jim Kirkham, the incoming president, and he agrees it will be a good idea for the committees to get input from each other. I want the Governors to be proactive instead of responsive."

Mamula also wants to work to improve the prestige of the Governors by making significant contributions. He also intends to improve the internal organization of the Governors – "our rules have never been codified, and that's something we're going to do."

Mamula has been an ACBL member since his college days in 1972, but he has been playing seriously only for about 10 years. He won the 200-300 category in the Mini-McKenney in 1993. He is a Silver Life Master with about 2100 points and about 20 regional wins.

His wife Linda, who is from the Cleveland area, also is active in bridge. She has served as president of both District 5 and the Cleveland unit.

Still going strong

Even though it was Thanksgiving, the table count was reasonable yesterday – 500.5 tables. The total now is 6602.5, so Birmingham 2000 still is on the road to perhaps 8500 tables.

Jacobus, Coren win squeaker in Blue Ribbon Pairs

Marc Jacobus of Las Vegas and Richard Coren of Fort Lauderdale FL won a squeaker in the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs last night, edging Steve Weinstein and Robert Levin by a margin of 7.53 matchpoints.

Top on a board was 31. Jacobus and Coren posted a final score of 966.70 to 959.17 for Weinstein and Levin. Another 12.07 points back were Bob Hamman and Zia Mahmood, with 947.10; only a single point behind them, at 946.10, were Larry Cohen and David Berkowitz.

Jacobus, a bridge professional who lives in Las Vegas, won his fourth North American championship: he has previous wins in the Vanderbilt, North American Swiss Teams and Life Master Men's Pairs. "I can say that I won a North American cham-

Mr. Smith goes to Washington – and everywhere else

For Glenn Smith, who describes himself as a man who's used to sleeping in his own bed, his term as ACBL president has presented a series of challenges.

Smith and his wife Marjorie have – so far – attended 10 regionals and all three NABCs. They've visited Bermuda, Houston, Hilton Head, Toronto, Lake Geneva, Champaign, Las Vegas, Calgary, St. Louis, Montreal and NABCs in Cincinnati, Anaheim and Birmingham. They took September off because "we just wanted to be home," said Glenn.

Still on tap is the Palm Springs regional in December "and that will be it," said Glenn.

One of his favorite memories: standing in front of a huge room at the White Hat Regional in Calgary, waving a big white hat and yelling, "Yahoo!"

The Smiths have enjoyed meeting "all the people who are putting on the tournaments, doing all the work and playing bridge," said Glenn. "We have so many good people in our organization.

"If it's not fun, we shouldn't be doing it," he added. "Bridge should be enjoyable."

Alan LeBendig elected to WBF Executive

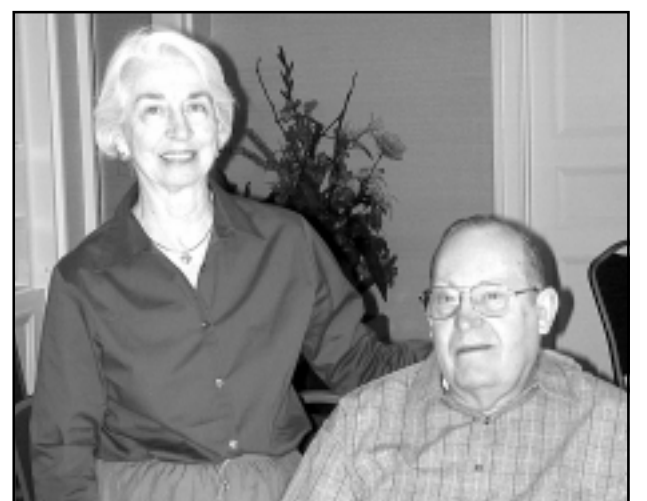
"I hope to make the World Bridge Federation more responsive to the wishes of the ACBL." That is one of the goals of Alan LeBendig of Los Angeles, newly elected ACBL representative to the WBF Executive Board. He succeeds Virgil Anderson of Springfield MO. He will serve a three-year term.

"We were close to a crisis position earlier this year when the WBF wanted to raise each country's membership fee from 10 cents to a dollar apiece. At first ACBL refused this, but later we offered a compromise of 50 cents. The WBF at first looked askance at this compromise offer but eventually accepted it."

LeBendig feels the ACBL should continue to be affiliated with the WBF, but he feels that the world organization has some financial problems.

"The WBF has made great strides in moving toward acceptance for bridge in the Olympic movement. I feel strongly that the ACBL should have a major participation in this effort. The WBF was also done so much for bridge in Europe – membership growth there has outdistanced North America in recent years. The WBF has done well in getting event sponsors and has been quite successful in making the world in general more aware of the game of bridge.

The deuce take it

What does it mean if, in fourth position, you “raise” the responder’s suit? Suppose that the dealer on your left bids 1♣, partner passes and the response is 1♠. What sort of hand do you need to bid 2♠?

Most experts agree that this should be a natural bid with long, strong spades, since there are other ways -- such as double -- to ask partner to bid. The 2♠ bidder should have (at least) a six-card suit. A five-card suit is insufficient, since the suit is known to be breaking badly.

Consider this example from the first qualifying session of the Edgar Kaplan Blue Ribbon Pairs.

Mike Passell and Mike Cappelletti, East-West, were due for a good result because, if South had maintained a discreet silence, West would probably have played in 1NT. That contract usually failed by more than one trick, and the scoresheet was plastered with minus 200s, 300s and even a 400.

West led the ♦K and shifted to a heart. East took his ace and returned a heart. South won the ♥K and led a diamond, won by West with the ace.

When West attempted to cash his winning ♥Q, his partner ruffed with the ♠6 and returned the ♠5. This reduced his trump length and apparently ruined his chance of wresting control of the trumps from declarer.

South took the ♠A and crossed to the ♣K, as East dropped the jack. Declarer cashed the ♦Q, discarding the ♥J, to reach this position:

South needed four of the last five tricks to make his contract. If he had cashed the ♣A and ruffed a club, he would have made an overtrick.

He feared, however, that the ♣A would be ruffed, so he led a diamond and ruffed with the ♠7. Cappelletti overruffed with the queen and led the ♥10. East pitched the ♣7 and South ruffed, losing control.

Passell, by carefully unblocking the 4 and 3 of trumps, had the rare pleasure of winning the last trick with the ♠2 for one down and all the matchpoints.

Hurrying along

Intermediate Newcomer Tournament Director Judy Cotterman urged her players to hurry if they wanted to play all the boards on their last round.

Cotterman walked by a table as the bidding went: Pass-1♣-Pass-6NT.

The 6NT bidder turned to Cotterman and said, “Well, you told us we needed to hurry up.”

P.S. – Declarer made seven for plus 1470.

Fine card reading

Ralph Cohen got pushed to an awkward level here but came through with the help of the defense and some nice card reading.

I did not have to raise Cohen to 3♥, but I thought he would have a good hand if he had five hearts – my mistake!

Cohen won the diamond lead and played the ♠J to the king and returned the 10 to North’s ace. A heart shift might be best now, but on the actual diamond play Cohen ruffed and led the ♠9, covered all around. He then led a club to the queen and ace. South now played the fourth spade on which Cohen pitched dummy’s club loser as North ruffed. North led a third diamond and Ralph ruffed to produce this ending with the lead in East.

Cohen crossed to the ♣K to ruff a fourth diamond. When he led the ♣9, South had the J-9-6 of trumps and North the queen – but between them they

could get only one trick. If South ruffs with the jack, declarer can finesse the 8 to take the last two tricks. If he ruffs low, declarer overruffs and cashes the trump ace. Contract made!

Our opponents did well to steal the contract on our next deal. The key for us was to set their partscore enough to compensate for missing our club or notrump partscore.

Cohen decided not to double 2♠ – I might have pulled it to 2NT anyway to reach 3♣ for a likely plus 150. But plus 100 was going to get us a very poor score, so we needed to pull out all the stops.

On the ♥8 lead to the queen, Cohen returned the ♥K, a thoughtful play to ensure the ruff. Declarer won the ace and quite reasonably took the diamond finesse (playing trumps was indicated, however). I won the king and returned a low diamond. Declarer took his ace and played a trump. Cohen won and gave me the heart ruff. Then I gave him the diamond ruff. Cohen cashed the ♠A and exited with the ♥10. Declarer ruffed but had to lose two clubs at the end – down three!

Salute to Birmingham

Roger Gill, who was here from Maryland for the first half of the NABC (he left to spend Thanksgiving with his family), stopped by the Tour Desk to pay his compliments to Birmingham.

Marge agreed. "We certainly have felt well-received wherever we went."

Their talk turns to a recent tournament where Glenn said hello to a pair arriving at his table. "They said we were the first people to speak to them all evening, and this was the last round."

Marge suggests name tags would make players more friendly -- or more conscious of the need to be friendly. "If you and I were playing," she began.

"What kind of fantasy is this?" interrupted Glenn.

"I took lessons before we were married," Marge explained, "and I decided it was something I didn't want to do. But I'm glad Glenn has a hobby he enjoys so much."

Glenn learned to play bridge while in college at St. Louis University and he took up duplicate bridge immediately. He and Marge were married in 1954. When family and professional obligations became demanding, he quit the tournament and club scene for 10 years.

He returned to bridge after their children -- four sons and a daughter -- were grown. In the spring of 1987, he contracted the mysterious Guillian-Barre Syndrome, with near-fatal consequences. "When someone gets Guillian-Barre, his body produces a substance that destroys all or part of the peripheral nervous system," he explained in an earlier interview. "In extreme cases like mine, the axon (core) of the nerves is destroyed."

Glenn recovered but not entirely. He requires the use of a cane when he walks and he frequently uses a wheelchair to move about.

He returned to work in 1989, and three years later, he retired as Senior Vice President of Finance for Laclede Gas Company of St. Louis, where he had worked for 36 years.

He became a member of the Unit 143 (St. Louis) Board of Directors and in 1993 was elected to the ACBL Board of Directors, replacing the legendary District 8 Director Ruth McConnell, who did not seek reelection. He has been twice reelected.

Now that Glenn's term as president is almost over, the Smiths are looking forward to a vacation in their Florida condominium -- and a chance to spend time with their 12 grandchildren.

Marge laughs as she tells about five-year-old Al and his twin brother racing into the living room. "Al was waiting for his turn to speak," she said, "and he noticed Glenn's picture on the cover of the January *Bridge Bulletin*. It was lying on the coffee table. He looked at the picture and he looked at Glenn. He looked at the picture again and he turned and pointed at Glenn."

Then there's three-year-old Colin who, six months earlier, tossed a baseball-sized ball into the air and hit it with a stick -- 10 times in a row. Grandma kept count -- 10 in a row.

"Well, that's no surprise," said Glenn. "His father (Dale, the Smiths' second son) had exceptional hand-eye coordination when he was a kid."

"When he was two and a half?" questioned Marge, who added, "We have a lot of fun with them."

"All this indicates quite strongly that it is in the best interests of both organizations to work together toward more and better bridge throughout the world."

LeBendig, a Grand Life Master with about 13,000 masterpoints, brings a strong bridge background to his new post. He is presently a member of the ACBL Board of Directors and the co-owner of the Barrington Bridge Club in Los Angeles. He was chairman of the Board of Governors from 1985 to 1987 and again in 1995 and 1996. He was elected to another term, but in the meantime he was elected to the Board of Directors.

He was co-chairman of the National Appeals Committee from 1984 to 1997 and was director of appeals in 1998. Now he is co-chairman of Appeals and Charges for the ACBL Board.

Strong bidding key for Senior victors

Richard Budd and his teammates believe their victory in the Senior Knockout Teams came primarily because their bidding was consistently strong. They looked over their scorecards during the post-game interview, and most of the boards they talked about involved good bidding sequences.

Three members of the team are still in the work force. Pat McDevitt is president and CEO of a trust company in Boston, and he formerly was a consulting engineer. Bill Hunter is a financial analyst, and Shome Mukherjee is a mathematics professor at the University of Massachusetts.

The other three are retired. Richard Budd, the team captain, was a physicist. Bob Ryder was a consultant actuary. In 1997 he was named Senior Player of the Year and as such won the George Burns Trophy. Richard DeMartino was an insurance executive, but he still is quite busy -- he was just elected as the District 25 representative to the ACBL Board of Directors, and he is a bridge teacher.

Here's a board from late in the final where Budd and Ryder were unhappy because they failed to bid the slam. Imagine their surprise when they learned they scored plus 10 on the deal.

The fifth diamond of course made it easy to get rid of the heart loser, so winning 12 tricks was easy. However, this was the bidding at the other table:

McDevitt decided to throw in a heart overcall despite the vulnerability. That made it easy for DeMartino carry on to 5♥ when the opponents bid the spade game. This was doubled, and the best the defense could do was to take a trump, a diamond and a club for minus 200 -- a fine save.

Budd and Ryder found a good route to slam on this deal from the second quarter.

Partners need help

Partners often need direction to make the right leads and plays. Gene Prosnitz and Kent Mignocchi cooperated perfectly on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Blue Ribbon Pairs.

Prosnitz led the ♣6, declarer put up the ace in dummy, and Mignocchi played the 4, a discouraging card that also showed a preference for diamonds. Declarer finessed in trumps, losing to the king, and Prosnitz won. He returned the diamond as requested, and Mignocchi got back to Prosnitz with a heart. Prosnitz led a second diamond, and declarer was down almost before he started.
