Long-distance partners win Red Ribbon Pairs

They may live 2000 miles apart, but Jim Johnsen and Paul Spear's game was definitely together last night as they won the four-session Red Ribbon Pairs.

Johnsen and Spear were 12th after Tuesday's two-session qualifier. They were fourth after the first final session and won the event with a score of 2651.65, about a board ahead of the second-place pair.

Johnsen, 39, of Los Angeles is employed in biotech clinical research and partner Spear, 43, of the Chicago area is a systems programmer. The two first met each other when Johnsen attended medical school in Chicago more than a decade ago.

"We knew each other from the Chicago clubs, but we never actually played together," said Spear. "Ironically, we played for the first time together only after Jim had moved away. Our first game was in the 1991 Fall NABC in Indianapolis."

Johnsen added, "Since then, we've played in various regionals and NABCs. If one of us visits the other, we might even

His double paid off, sort of -- he went down three tricks.

Then the director was called. Why? Because North and South didn't think West had enough high card points for his 2♣ bid. No mention of the bizarre play circumstances. It was only when the director asked some questions that the truth came out.

Jacobs' turn for huge comeback

The team captained by George Jacobs was the comeback king yesterday. His team was trailing 80-23 at the half against Dave Treadwell and Co. They closed to 123-105 in the third quarter, then kept plugging away through the final 16 boards to advance to the Round of 16 in the Spingold Knockout Teams. The final tally: JACOBS 157, TREADWELL 150. Playing with Jacobs are Ralph Katz, Alan Sontag, Peter Weichsel, and Italians Lorenzo Lauria and Alfredo Versace.

The Swedish Juniors had the thrill of their lives playing against the Nick Nickell team, many-time winners of this event. NICKELL won, 164-106, but the team members were very im-

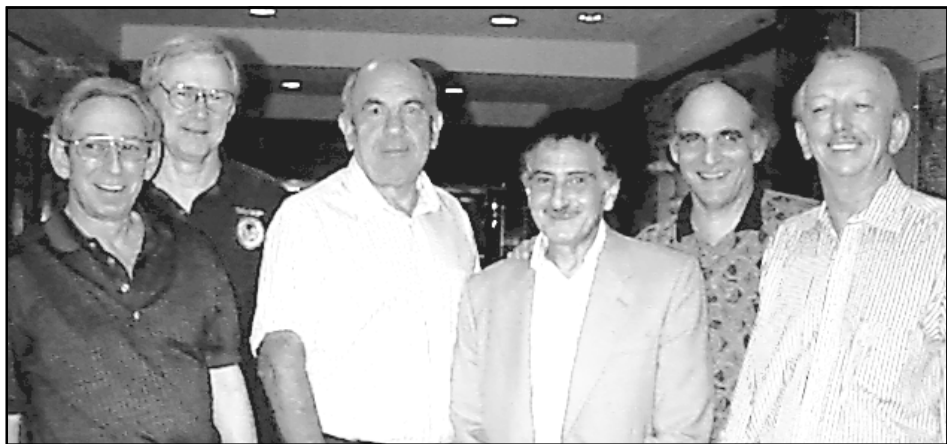
NABCs now truly international

It wasn't too many years ago that almost everybody who came to an NABC was either an American or a Canadian with the occasional player from Mexico or Bermuda. Apparently those days are gone forever -- at least 25 nations in addition to the four ACBL countries are represented here in Chicago.

The list starts with the United States, Canada, Mexico and Bermuda. We have a large delegation here from the Nordic countries -- Norway, Sweden, Iceland, Denmark and Finland. Other European countries include Great Britain, the Netherlands, France, Italy, Poland, Russia, Germany, Austria, Israel, Switzerland, Greece and Ireland.

From the Far East and the South Pacific we have Japan, China, New Zealand and Australia. Add to these the Mideast -- Israel, India and Pakistan.

Two other countries from the American hemisphere are here as well -- Argentina and Panama.

Levine wins Senior Swiss

The team captained by Mike Levine scored 127 Victory Points in the final of the Senior Swiss Teams to take first place honors.

Levine, of Boca Raton FL, played with teammates Zeke Jabbour, also of Boca Raton, Fred Hamilton of Fresno CA, Arnie Fisher of Clementon NJ, Rich Reisig of Delray Beach FL and P.O. Sundelin of Stockholm Sweden.

This is the second NABC victory for Levine, who has previously won the Senior Knockout Teams. It is also the second NABC win for Arnie Fisher, who had a previous win in the North American Swiss Teams. Rich Reisig is yet another member of the squad for whom the victory is his second; he was on the winning Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams in 1984.

For Zeke Jabbour, the victory is another in a long line of NABC Senior events.

For Fred Hamilton, this is his tenth NABC victory and his second here in Chicago. Hamilton was on the winning GNT-A squad from District 22.

P.O. Sundelin has represented his native Sweden in countless world championship events. He won the Sun-

Wei-Sender revives to reach Wagar semi

Comeback is the key word in reports on NABC knockout events at this tournament. In the Wagar Women's KO, Kathie Wei-Sender and Co. were down, 95-23, at the half against Jo Morse. A 73-19 third quarter pulled WEI-SENDER to within 18 IMPs. The pressure continued through the final quarter, 62-12, so that WEI-SENDER won easily, so to speak, 158-126. WEI-SENDER, seeded second, will play the team captained by Edith Freilich in one of today's semifinals. Playing with Kathie are Juanita Chambers, Stasha Cohen, Pam Wittes, Irina Levitina and Jill Levin.

The other three quarterfinal matches were devoid of comebacks.

And now . . . the rest of the story!

Remember that hand in yesterday's Daily Bulletin -- the hand in the story about Jim Reiman's coming from 60 down after three quarters and coming back to win by 24? That hand was crucial, but not in the way it appeared in yesterday's report. That hand is the one of the reasons the comeback was even possible.

First the correction. The deal was played in the SECOND quarter, not the bizarre fourth.

Another correction. Boris Baran and Harry Tudor want it known that they were NOT playing during that fateful fourth quarter.

The swing on the board was 11 IMPs -- plus 790 at one table and minus 200 at the other. The possibility is strong that REIMAN wouldn't have even played the final quarter if that contract had gone down. They would have been minus 200 at both tables for a 9-IMP loss, so they would have been down 80 at three-quarters instead of 60.

"We don't like to give up," said Jim Reiman, "but we might have thought 80 was too much to overcome. And we would have been wrong!"

Concerning the State of Bridge

While shmoozing in the coffee shop, I was tapped on the shoulder by my long-time dear friend, Sandy Trent, who sat down at my table and said, "I would like you to write something about the state of bridge."

Sandy hasn't attended a tournament in two years, and before that only sparingly. Add to that the fact that Sandy and husband Paul are true lovers of the purity of the game -- they are as close to perfectionists as anyone I know. Once my wife Pamela and I visited them for dinner at their home and Sandy posed a bidding problem, which we then discussed for three hours as dinner was forgotten. It's lucky, the kids knew where the cereal was.

The point is, when I heard her suggest that I write about the state of bridge, I braced myself for a tirade about the awful state of overbidding or some such thing, and knew that nobody would want to read about it. But, surprise, Sandy said, "I was kibitzing the Spingold and a team from China was playing two of my friends, and hand after hand not one mistake in the cardplay was made. I just sat there and watched in awe."

Well, this was refreshing. "It was the same in the Life Master Pairs. Paul and I played pair after pair who rarely lost a trick. We messed up on a few hands, and all the rest of the boards were average. Then it was pointed out to me that most of the pairs in our section were foreign pairs, many unseeded. Apparently the state of bridge in the world has improved tremendously."

The following deal is from the Spingold match between China and a top American team that won the match by a small margin.

Dlr: West ♠ A Q 3
Vul: E-W ♥ K 7 5 2
♦ A 9 8 7 4
♣ 3

♠ 8 6 5
♥ A 4
♦ K Q 10 6 2
♣ A J 8

The Chinese had reached the tremendous contract of 6♦ and West's opening lead was the ♠4. How would you play it? (No peeking, please.)

Solution

As in the previous boards that Sandy had watched, the declarer demonstrated technical per-

fection. He won the first trick with the ♠A and led a trump to the king. Everyone followed. Declarer drew a second round of trumps as West discarded a spade. Next came the ♣A and a club, ruffed in dummy. Then the ♥A and a heart to the king, and a heart ruffed in hand. Now the last club was ruffed in dummy and the last heart ruffed in hand. There were two spades and one trump in each hand:

North
♠ Q 3
♥ --
♦ A
♣ --

South
♠ 8 6
♥ --
♦ 10
♣ --

South led a spade to the queen. The bad news: the king was offside. The good news: The king was originally doubleton, so East had to give a ruff and sluff and the slam made. The full deal was:

♠ A Q 3	♠ K 10
♥ K 7 5 2	♥ J 10 6 3
♦ A 9 8 7 4	♦ 5 3
♣ 3	♣ Q 9 5 4 2
♠ J 9 7 4 2	♠ 8 6 5

The Chinese team lost -- but not by much. "Mainly," said Sandy, "they lost because of their bidding. It wasn't quite as accurate as their opponents', which is surprising, because you generally think that bidding is the easiest part of the game for players to master. But one thing was interesting: When the wheels did come off in the bidding, they never got upset with each other. Their comportment at the table was remarkable. Not a frown or a bad word to partner -- they would pick up the cards to the next board and march forward."

One last thought: A surprising number of the Chinese players today use Standard American methods, but without the latest updates and nuances. I'm going to suggest to Kathie-Wei Sender that she promote Precision better in China -- perhaps this would have made the difference in this match. If you recall the early Seventies, a number of Chinese teams (and American teams) did well mainly BECAUSE of their Precision system. If you can play your cards well and you can comport yourself well at the table, a good bidding system for slam bidding will obviously complete the picture.

Post-mortem

My son Colin (who was okayed for the ACBL Junior Corps earlier this week) was lucky enough to get to play for Canada in the World Junior Championships last year. He became somewhat notorious during the event by pointing out the correct analysis of a complex squeeze hand to me and my colleagues on the Daily Bulletin staff one night. When he went down in a slam here on Tuesday, I wasn't surprised that he would not be satisfied until he'd discovered the winning line of play.

Dlr: North ♠ K Q J 10 7 6
Vul: None ♥ 9 6 4

North opened a weak two-bid in spades, and after an auction that owed more to youthful enthusiasm than to science, Colin became declarer in 6♣ doubled as West. South had doubled diamonds along the way, so North led the ♦10. Colin ducked this in dummy, ruffed in hand, and led a heart to the jack, hoping this would lose, as it did. If South was good enough to find the heart return, he would pay off to him, but otherwise the contract could stand even a 4-1 or 5-0 trump break now. South duly returned a diamond. However, Colin decided to guard against 4-1 clubs rather than 7-1 diamonds, so he ruffed in with the 9, and went down one.

Comparing notes with other pairs, we found declarers quite often having trouble coming to more than nine tricks. However, Colin quickly pointed out to me the line he should have taken, and which would have worked on the actual layout. Ruff the opening lead, play the ♠A, and ruff a spade with the queen. Now draw trumps in three rounds and play the ♥K and a heart to the jack. If this wins, you have at least 12 tricks; if it loses, South is out of black cards and has to put you in dummy to claim the rest.

Like so many such plays, it's easier to find in the post-mortem than at the table!

The Facts: 2♥ made four, plus 170 for E/W. N/S started to inquire as to the meaning of the direct cuebid and was told by East that she didn't know what it meant. South cut her off at that point, believing that further explanation would help E/W. N/S made no effort to protect themselves. The Director ruled that N/S had not been damaged and allowed the table result to stand.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. They stated that E/W had only one filled-out convention card, and dummy was inconsistent with what was listed on the card as to the bid's meaning. Confusion led to North's failure to balance and he subsequently misdefended. E/W were a husband and wife who have played together for many years, but rarely duplicate (they have 75 masterpoints between them). They mostly played kitchen bridge where anything goes and were not familiar with the use of convention cards.

The Decision: N/S never asked either opponent for any explanations after the auction or before the opening lead. North was especially at fault, since even at his skill level (approximately 150 masterpoints) he should have determined that he should have acted (bid his spade suit) in the pass-out position. The N/S partnership could have easily defeated 2♥. Instead, two overtricks were made. The Committee allowed the table result, 2♥ made four, to stand.

E/W were reminded of their obligation to have some understanding of the meaning of their bids so that their opponents could be informed of what those bids mean. Also, they were told that they needed to completely fill out two convention cards identically and completely and have them available for the opponents. The Committee complimented the players for choosing to use the appeal process to straighten out their confusion, something that new players almost never consider. All four players were encouraged to continue having a good time at their first NABC.

Youngest-ever champs to defend IMP Pairs

Tom Carmichael and Joel Wooldridge, the youngest pair ever to win a North American Championship, will defend their title when play begins today in the IMP Pairs.

Carmichael, then 23, and Wooldridge, then 18, came from behind on the last round to win the event last year in Albuquerque.

The previous age record for an NABC title was set when Jeff Meckstroth, then 22, and Eric Rodwell, then 21, won the Open Pairs title at the 1979 Spring NABC in Norfolk VA.

Lebhar Trophy

Players will compete for the Lebhar Trophy, donated by Bertram Lebhar Jr. in 1948 in memory of his wife Evelyn. The trophy was previously given to winners of the Mixed Teams but was re-designated for the IMP Pairs by the ACBL Board of Directors.

Lebhar (1907-1972), under the name of Bert Lee, earned a national reputation as a sportscaster and later as a bridge player and administrator. In private life, he owned radio and television stations in Florida.

Perhaps his greatest achievement arose from his work as ACBL treasurer from 1945 to 1947 and as a member of the Steering Committee.

In the late Forties, Lebhar was instrumental in the modernization of ACBL. He was perhaps the first to visualize ACBL's vast potential for expansion. His farsighted efforts were recognized when he was named *ACBL Honorary Member* in 1963.

Lebhar was one of the founders of the Greater New York Bridge Association and was elected its first president in 1948.

Lebhar was also a player: he won the Spingold in 1940 and the Master Mixed Teams in 1946. His team was his wife Evelyn along with Samuel Katz and Alicia Kemper.

Lebhar was second in the Chicago (now the Reisinger) and the Vanderbilt in 1946 and 1947, the Spingold in 1953, the Life Master Pairs in 1945 and the Men's Pairs in 1936.

Walter Johnson started with the ♥Q. Marty took dummy's ace and led the ♣10. When East played low smoothly, Marty went up with the ace and led a spade to the king, losing to the ace. East led a heart to partner's jack, and Marty ruffed the heart continuation. He cashed the ♠K and ruffed a club. Marty led dummy's last heart, discarding a diamond as East won with the king. Then came the key play -- Walter discarded a diamond in tempo.

"If Walter had held two spades," Marty said, "I knew he would ruff and lead his last club, hoping to set up a trump trick for partner. So I knew he had either three trumps or one. The only question was which." East returned a diamond to Marty's ace, and Marty made his decision -- he ruffed his last club with dummy's queen. Then he led a trump and finessed the 8 to make his game.

This was in a three-way match in which each team won one match. Marty's team qualified on quotient, but the question was -- who was the other qualifier? Because the margin against Walter's team was small, Walter's team advanced, and Marty's squad went into the 32 boards ahead by 22 IMPs. If the Jimmy Cayne team had qualified, Marty and company would have gone into the last set 26 IMPs in arrears.

they've worked at tournaments for a long time and they really work hard," said Matthews.

Caddy Chad Krause is a perfect example of what Matthews is talking about. Krause, 20, of Pittsburgh is a student at Robert Morris College studying computer education.

"I began caddying sectionals when I was 7 and regionals when I was 13," said Krause. He's a bridge player as well, but isn't playing in Chicago.

"My car broke down recently, so I need the money," Krause said, smiling. "It's a great way to make some cash." Caddies are paid \$20 per session.

Two caddies who are a long way from home are Michaela Rothstein and Tina Sundelin, both of Stockholm, Sweden. Sundelin, 15, is the daughter of experts P.O. Sundelin and Jill Mellstrom, but she doesn't play bridge.

"The rest of my family plays enough. I'm differ-

ent," said a laughing Sundelin.

Rothstein, 16, is a friend of Tina's who came with the Sundelins to visit the U.S. for the first time.

Francis Czyzowicz (pronounced *CHEJ-o-vich*), 15, currently lives in Ottawa PQ. He is here in Chicago with his father, who is playing.

"My parents are both natives of Warsaw, Poland. I was born in Algeria, however, and we later moved to Canada," he said. Czyzowicz's international wandering has had the positive effect of making the high school junior fluent in English, French and Polish.

Jason Lindop, 20, of Toronto ON is also caddying this tournament. He is the son of David Lindop and well-known ACBL teacher and author Audrey Grant. Like his parents, he is also a player.

"Every Monday night, I play with my sister Joanne at the Toronto Bridge Club," he said.

Meggan Carmichael, 20, of Lincoln NE has been caddying NABCs for eight years. She attends Nebraska Wesleyan and is studying social work. "I've been doing this awhile, and I still enjoy it," she said. □

As South played her jack, she was trying to figure what discards she was going to make as the defense cashed all their diamonds.

After a couple of minutes, one of the opponents got declarer's attention and said, "It's your lead, you know." She asked to see the trick, and sure enough, the jack had won the trick. She quickly regained her composure and gathered in her 11 tricks.
