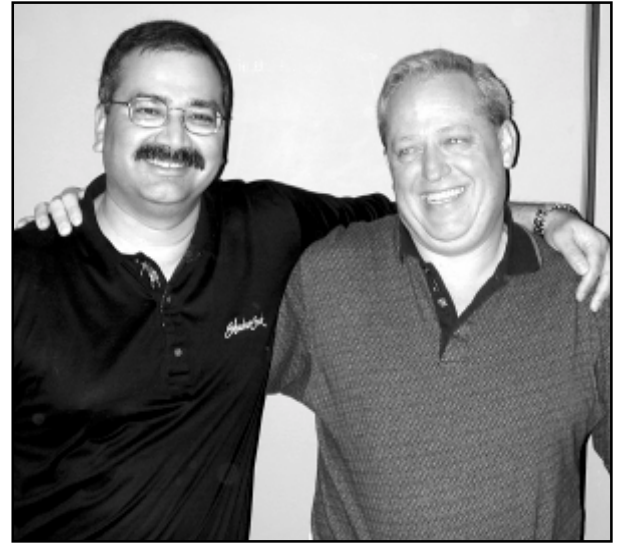

Steve Landen and Pratap Rajadhyaksha have played together 18 years and come in second in several major events. Until Friday, they had never been in the winner's circle together.

They rectified that situation in grand style, winning Open Pairs II by more than 120 matchpoints with two strong games in the final of the event.

Second place went to Ken Kranyak of Bay Village OH and Harry Stratton of Columbus OH.

Rajadhyaksha, formerly of Michigan but now living in Powell, in the Columbus area, won his first North American championship after several second-place finishes.

Among his second-place finishes are the North American Pairs and the Grand National Teams, both in partnership with Landen. "I've been second a lot," said Rajadhyaksha.

He has done computer consulting work, but for the last couple of years he has been a stay-at-home dad, taking care of six-year-old Samantha and five-year-old Matthew. The younger child has cerebral palsy and is wheelchair bound, so Landen has his hands full.

Winners give back 49er Pairs trophies

As reported in Thursday's Daily Bulletin, James Rash and Geraldine Robson were the winners of the two-session NABC 49er Pairs on Wednesday. But they didn't win. The mistakes they found cost them the victory, but "We can't live with this. We didn't win."

They took their game report home with them, but they didn't come in to play on Thursday.

When they arrived to play yesterday, they sought out Tournament Director Judy Cotterman. "The scores for three of our boards are wrong," they said.

They were right - somehow the same score ticket had been entered for two different pairs. The scores shown for them on the recap sheet were minus 50, minus 150 and minus 50. Their actual scores on those boards were minus 1460, minus 200 and minus 130.

When the scores were tallied, Rash and Robson had tumbled to fifth place, the last place to count in the overall. The new winners were Daniel Taylor of Littleton CO and Judith Hunt of Englewood Co.

New caddies perform like veterans

It's Cabo Mining Day

Today is Cabo Mining Day at the Cincinnati NABC. Today's Open Pairs event is the Digital Network Services Pairs. Digital Network Services (DNS) is part of Cabo. What is the background of today's sponsor, Cabo Mining?

It started out as a mining company in 1984, but it is much more than that today. The company was established as a publicly traded company on the Vancouver Stock Exchange in 1986. But the big change came late last year when Cabo acquired Digital Network Services (DNS).

DNS assists independent international and U.S. interexchange carriers (IXC's), major international corporations, select affinity groups and foreign countries in identifying cost effective alternative telecommunication needs. It provides unique, state of the art solutions to maintain effective international networks, with significant cost savings.

DNS has formed a telecommunications joint venture for providing Peruvians with direct access to the world-wide voice data network. Working in cooperation with DNS is the Consultoria and Gestion de Telecomunicaciones S.A. of Peru. The result of the joint venture will be excellent telecommunications in Peru.

Other projects in the works include fiber connections between Sao Paulo, Brazil, and New York; between Sao Paulo and Rio de Janeiro, and between New York and Lima, Peru. Private voice and data networks between Miami and Haiti, Trinidad, Jamaica, Mexico and all Central American countries are also in the works.

Cabo is still in the mining exploration business as well. As a matter of fact, Cabo officials see a connection between mining and telecommunications — both require exploration and follow-through once something is discovered.

George Johnson, who took ATC Communications from a small start-up in 1982 to a company that sold for \$1 billion to LDDS (now known as MCI Worldcom) in 1991, and who now is in charge of DNS, enjoys bridge in his spare time. He is a Life Master. Mike Rahtjen, a top-flight bridge player, works with DNS as a consultant.

The value of Cabo shares has risen rapidly since becoming a publicly traded company. At present it trades on the Canadian Venture Exchange. The symbol for Cabo is CEV.

Bad news and good news — in that order

Grace Jeklin of Vancouver BC went to the Partnership Desk on Thursday and found a partner for the Open Pairs. It became clear early on that this was not going to be a fun day. Grace's partner had derogatory things to say on just about every board. Grace was feeling worse — all she could think of was that she had to play a second session with this woman. She knew the ACBL expects players to honor their commitment and play in the sessions for which they signed up. What Jeklin didn't know was Zero Tolerance.

On the next-to-last round, Jeklin and her partner played against Lynn Deas and Curtis Cheek. Jeklin's partner told Jeklin that she should go back to Flight C where she belonged. Deas told her that was not a nice thing to say. The woman reiterated that Jeklin belonged in Flight C. On the last round, Deas and Cheek could hear Jeklin being harassed once again.

After the game finished, Deas and Cheek sought Jeklin out. They told her there was no reason in this wide world why she should have to accept such abuse, and there also was no reason why she would have to play in the second session. They went to Henry Cukoff, the director.

After listening to the story, he told Jeklin that she did not have to play another session with this objectionable partner. He said she would not be allowed to play in the second session. He also gave Jeklin a note entitling her to a free play.

Then Jeklin was told about Zero Tolerance. Under the ZT plan, no one has to accept abuse from a partner or an opponent. If unpleasantness arises at a table, the players should call the director and report the details. The director has the right to impose strong disciplines if convinced that the report is true.

In other words, Jeklin could have called the director early in the session if she had known about ZT. Once the director heard the sordid details, chances are the director would have told the offender that she was through for the day. At the very least she would have received a stern warning.

No doubt there are many others like Jeklin who don't know they have recourse available to them if someone gets abusive. Both Deas and Cheek now feel they should have called the director while the abuse was taking place at their table. But they followed through and did a good education job with Jeklin.

Mother and son hit 74% on first try

Renee Shunta and her 13-year-old son, Cameron flew in from Muskegon MI on Thursday and headed for the Intermediate/Newcomer area. They tried the 20/50/100 Stratified Pairs and sped away from the field. They piled up a 74.61% game, one of the biggest of the tournament. They won the 50 and 100 strats, but Renee's 35 points made her ineligible for the 20 contest. Cameron had only seven points going in.

The seventh grader has been playing bridge for about a year and a half, but this is the first time he has played in a big tournament — and it's a first for his mother as well. However, Cameron has discovered OKbridge, where he signs on as Young One.

Alex Ornstein gave me a hand from the Mixed Pairs qualifying which he said demonstrated adequately the theory that successful Mixed Pairs strategy and good bridge do not have to go hand in hand!

Ornstein played in 3NT after a North-South auction of 1♦ - 1♥ - 2NT - 3NT. He correctly ducked the ♣Q opening lead, then won the next club in dummy to pass the ♠10, the best percentage shot for the contract. Of course, as the cards lie the declarer can build a spade trick for his ninth winner — but something strange happened — the ♠10 held the trick!

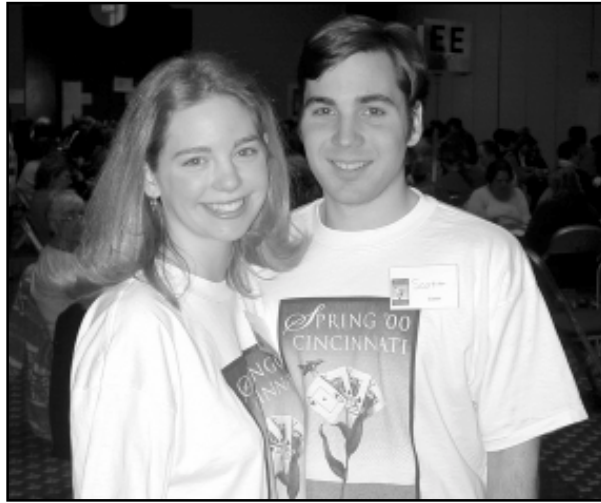
Now at teams you'd run for home with your nine tricks, but Ornstein looked a little deeper into the hand and decided to go for broke by leading a low heart from dummy. When West played low, Ornstein ducked. That let East in. What could be more normal than to clear the clubs while he still had his spade entry intact? Alas, that let Ornstein take his 10 tricks for a spectacular score.

agrees with Matthews: "Every shift, I've had two or three new people, but they catch on really quickly. I've had fun working with them." The other two national head caddies are Travis Radtke of Fort Collins CO and Elaine Ware of Vernon BC.

One of the newcomers to the caddy world is Bridget Conforti of Bellevue KY in the Cincinnati area. She is a theater major at Northern Kentucky University. The chairman of the Theater Department at NKU, Joe Conger, is a bridge player, and he pointed some of the students in the direction of the NABC as a way to earn a few bucks during spring break.

Conforti, 18, and Scott Youger, also a theater major at NKU, say they have enjoyed the new experience of caddying.

"After you do this for a while, you start hearing 'Caddy!' in your sleep," Conforti says.

For Youger, 22, the job is not exactly what he expected. "I thought it was going to be a lot more confusing."

Youger and Conforti are in a stage production called "Royal Family." He plays her fiancé. Both long for careers in the theater – she in New York, he in London – and both are crazy about Matthews. "She is just wonderful," says Conforti.

Two other rookies are Lisa Burton and Michelle Griffin, a pair of 16-year-olds from Austin TX.

Griffin is the daughter of James Griffin, three-time winner (with Kenneth Schutze) of the North American Pairs, Flight A.

Burton and Griffin, friends at Westwood High School in Austin, had nothing to do during spring break, so they decided to make the trip to Cincinnati. Describing her dad's interest in bridge, Griffin says, "He's been playing for, like, ever."

Says Burton: "It's actually fun to meet new people from everywhere. That's the neatest part."

Both want to play bridge. Says Burton: "I want to learn so bad."

Another new helper is Thelma Blubaugh, a Brazilian woman who wed John Blubaugh last week. She has enjoyed the caddying experience as "a good way to know people and make some friends." The exposure to bridge has given Thelma a yen to know more – even to learn the game.

"I'm curious to know how it works," says Thelma.

Chris Collins, another newcomer to caddying, is also curious about bridge. In fact, he signed on as a caddy with the idea of kibitzing as much as he could. "I want to watch," says Collins, 18, a freshman at the University of Cincinnati. "I'm just beginning to play."

Collins, who is majoring in computer network support, says he has worked harder than he thought he would – but not too hard. "It's a lot of footwork."

Matthews says the caddies have come from various sources, including some American Bridge Association players. One of them, Keith Stephens of Cincinnati, has been working three sessions a day since Sunday. Betty Bratcher, who has worked with Stephens in the newcomer games, says he has been called upon to fill as a player several times in the Intermediate/Newcomer games. "He's really having fun," Bratcher says.

Elizabeth Harris, another ABA player serving as a caddy, says she enjoys the work because "it keeps you busy. It's better when you're busy."

Matthews says that although she and the veteran caddies have spent a lot of time training the newcomers, "they're all so bright they pick it up very quickly. People have been stopping me to tell me how good the caddies are."

Many of the players, she adds, have been very friendly to the caddies. Says Matthews: "I want to thank everyone who has made the caddies' lives pleasant."

All over the map – 27 different contracts

Dianne Barton-Paine, a tournament director from San Francisco, was working the afternoon game Tuesday and was called to the table to make a ruling on Board 15. At the time, she thought the auction was "unusual," so she starting watching the board as the afternoon progressed.

By the end of the session, Barton-Paine was enthralled with the deal – so much so that she spent a couple of days researching the activity on Board 15. What she found is enough to make a baseball statistician's mouth water.

First, the deal.

Barton-Paine researched the activity on this deal through 10 sections of the NABC Mixed Pairs and seven sections of the regional Stratified Open Pairs.

There were 31 different matchpoints results, 12 different North-South contracts and 15 different East-West contracts.

North-South played everything from a calm 2♥ to 4♥ doubled, while East-West found themselves in a range of contracts from 2♦ (on a 4-1 fit) to 6♣, which has no play unless your mother is on defense. Come to think of it, though, mom would probably double you just for having such a bad auction.

Barton-Paine discovered that the most common contract was 3♥ doubled (24 times), followed by 3NT by East or West (22 times).

Incredibly, spade contracts were played by South, East and West, notrump contracts were played by North, East and West, and diamond contracts were played by North, South and East.

North-South contracts were 2♥, 2♠, 2♣ doubled, 2♣ redoubled, 2NT doubled, 3♦, 3♠ doubled, 3♥, 3♥ doubled, 4♦ doubled, 4♥ and 4♥ doubled.

East-West contracts were 2♦, 2♠, 2NT, 3♣, 3♦, 3♠, 3♣ doubled, 3NT, 4♣, 4♠, 4♠ doubled, 4NT, 5♣, 5♣ doubled and 6♣.

Scores ranged from minus (or plus) 50 to minus 2200, which occurred twice when 2♠ redoubled went down four.

On another occasion, the same contract went down only three for minus 1600. The defenders who got 2♠ doubled five tricks are probably annoyed that they didn't get one of the redoubled shots.

There were several scores which were not repeated, including 3♥ doubled making three for plus 730, 5♣ doubled making five for plus 550 and 3♦ by East (the 4-1 fit) down five for minus 250.

The tale of the eight of spades

It's clear that it's impossible to make 4♥ on this deal from the Charity Knockouts. But Larry Mori did, thanks to a strange discard by his right-hand opponent.

You have to lose one spade, the ♦ A, a diamond ruff, a club, right? Wrong!

West led his singleton diamond, and East gave him a ruff after winning the ace. The ♦ 2 asked for a club back, so West led a club to the ace. East won

and led a third diamond. This time Mori rose with the trump ace as West pitched the ♠ 9. Mori took the trump king and queen, then ruffed a diamond, setting up two long diamonds. He could get two discards, but he needed three. He led to the ♥ J and everyone pitched spades on the good diamonds. Next came the ♥ 8, and East fell from grace – he discarded the ♠ 10. That put more pressure on West than he could bear. He had to come down to two cards, but he knew he had to save the doubleton ♣ Q – so he pitched the ♠ A. South had pitched his last spade.

That made the ♠ 8 the master spade the first time the suit was led, allowing Mori to get rid of his last loser. The ♣ K took the last trick, which also was the game-going trick.

Happy birthday!

Friends of former ACBL Presidents Doug Drew and Dick Anderson threw a surprise birthday party for them yesterday – even though it wasn't either's birthday. Drew turned 70 on March 3, and Anderson will hit the 60th milestone on the 20th. In the toast given for them, they were told, "Every day after today is an overtrick."

What's that again?

Tournament director Sue Doe was called to the table for a ruling. After hearing the choices, the player asked, "Can I call for the lead of that suit?" Sue said yes. The player responded, "Then I so do, Sue Doe."

The Facts: 6♠ made six, plus 1430 for E/W. The Director was called at the time of the 6♠ bid. All players were in agreement that East took "a long time" before bidding 5♠. West stated that he bid 6♠ because his 5♥ bid was a misbid in their Roman Key Card system. The Director ruled that there was no disagreement that the break in tempo had occurred. Pass was determined to be a logical alternative to the action selected. The contract was changed to 5♠ made six, plus 680 for E/W.

The Appeal: E/W appealed the Director's ruling and were the only players to attend the hearing. E/W had 375 and 1000 masterpoints respectively. East believed that the 5♠ bid took at least 15 seconds and perhaps more as he had a lot to consider, including bidding 6♠ and hoping for a successful spade finesse. West said he forgot about the trump king (he thought he had two aces without the queen and after he bid he remembered the trump king); his correct bid was 5♦. He said that even before his partner took time, he had decided that if his partner bid 5♠ he would bid 6♠; or raise 6♠ to 7♠. E/W never considered that 4NT might be quantitative. They said that 4NT was always Key Card and never plain Blackwood ever since they experienced some misunderstandings a couple of years ago.

The Panel Decision: This appeal is strikingly similar to a misbid in a Key Card Blackwood auction at the Vancouver NABC (*Grizzly Experiences in Vancouver - Case Two*) in which the Panel had accepted expert opinion that passing was not a logical alternative to bidding the slam. The experts in that case were nearly unanimous in their opinion that the bids on the table and irrefutable logic compelled bidding the slam. In this case the Panel went through the steps: (1) Was there an unmistakable hesitation? Yes. (2) Did the break suggest that bidding 6♠ would be more successful than passing? Yes. (3) Was pass a logical alternative to bidding 6♠ (would some number of West's peers seriously consider it?) This was the question that was put to several experts. Two players were consulted together and one was slightly on the side of allowing 6♠, the other slightly more in favor of pass. Both could be swayed by strong arguments and both were hard-

pressed to find a hand when 6♠ was wrong. The third player strongly supported bidding 6♠ while the fourth believed that unless the pair might be bidding straight Blackwood or quantitative, the 6♠ bid should be allowed. The fifth player didn't like out-of-tempo Blackwood but believed that pass was not a logical alternative, and he would not have even called the Director. Player six thought the reasons for bidding 6♠ were sound but self serving and would not allow the bid. Player seven would not allow a bid because once the captain has asked the question, then huddles, then signs off, the result stands failing overwhelming reason.

The Panel accepted these opinions as establishing that some number of West's peers would at least seriously consider passing. Therefore, pass was a logical alternative. In coming to the decision the Panel considered whether or not the time to re-evaluate was authorized, and concluded that even though the time itself was part of the auction, and therefore authorized, the unauthorized information was the fact that partner was considering a call which should have been (almost) automatic based on the reply to Blackwood. That break in tempo demonstrably suggested that the responder to Blackwood review the auction and the calls he made, to find the one which gave partner the cause for this consideration. Unlike a continued Blackwood 5NT auction where partner is asked to evaluate his hand with a grand slam in mind, in the present auction without the unauthorized information it was a logical alternative to assume that partner's captaincy governs and that he knows where to place the contract after the response. No need for re-evaluation, re-assessment, or re-count of controls is necessary. The Panel changed the contract to 5♠ made five, plus 680 for E/W (Law 12C2).

The Facts: 6♦ made six, plus 920 for N/S. The opening lead was the ♠A. The 5♦ bid was made after some thought. The Director ruled that pass was a logical alternative for South and the 6♦ bid was

demonstrably suggested. The contract was changed to 5♦ made six, plus 420 for N/S.

The Appeal: N/S appealed the Director's ruling. South said that when his partner bid 4♦, which by agreement was a slam try showing a five-card suit, he was intending always to bid a small slam. He said it seemed sure that his partner had at least two of the cover cards he needed.

South considered bidding 4♥ (systemically defined to be Roman Keycard Blackwood; the suit above the "agreed" minor) but was afraid in the present auction that his partner might take it to be natural with a five-card suit and pass.

Since 4♠ would be natural, he cuebid 5♣ hoping his partner could bid 5♠ on the way, in which case he would have bid 5NT—grand slam force. With their Blackwood agreements in doubt he decided that 5♣ was the only possible advance. N/S said they were not experienced as a partnership, having played together three or four times before.

They had no system notes and had put their card together in about an hour. They had specifically agreed that the 4♦ bid was a slam try with four spades and five or more diamonds. They had also agreed that if there was a clearly agreed minor, then the suit over the minor was Blackwood. N/S agreed that the amount of time taken to bid 5♦ was quite long.

The Committee Decision: Given that the break in tempo was agreed upon and given that there was no dispute that it suggested further action, the only question for the Committee was whether there was a logical alternative to bidding 6♦. The Committee discounted South's contention that he was personally committed to bidding 6♦.

The definition of logical alternative used by the ACBL is a bid that some number of the players, peers would have seriously considered. The Committee considered such hands as ♠J10xx ♥Q ♦K10xxx ♣KQ and ♠J10xx ♥Qx ♦Axxx ♣KQ for North. With the first two aces are missing while with the second the trump suit will be playable for no losers in fewer than 50% of the cases. The Committee thought that both of these might be hands with which North would try for slam in diamonds and then bid 5♦. The break in tempo suggests that North has neither of these hands and makes the 6♦ bid a certainty. While most good players (of whom South clearly was one) would bid 6♦ on this auction in a vacuum, there would have been some who would have seriously considered passing to protect against the lighter hands North might have for his slam try.

Therefore, under the Laws and ACBL regulations, it was appropriate to not allow the 6♦ bid. The contract was changed to 5♦ made six, plus 420 for N/S.

He wrote the book

In the Senior Pairs, a partnership sat down to play against Max Hardy, author of books and a major authority on five-card majors. The visiting pair announced that they were playing five-card majors and that a two-level new-suit response to an opening suit bid was forcing to game.

The auction then proceeded: 1♠ - 2♣ - 2♦ - 2♠ - PASS! The partner of the passer turned to Hardy and asked plaintively, "You wrote the book. She can't pass, can she?" Hardy agreed she couldn't pass - but she did!

Bull defends himself, picks Nickell

The Bull spent the better part of the day with his DC spin doctor, national media people and personal assistants fending off an anti-bovine attack published in yesterday's Daily Bulletin.

None other than the illustrious *New York Times* bridge columnist Alan Truscott (rumored to be a secret agent of the WBF) believes that marking the number of tempo breaks by each player establishes a semi-reasonable manner in which to decide a Venice Cup.

Of course, the Bull would like for the time-keeping mechanism to give credit for fast play as a counterweight to slow play. This would have given the world's No. 1-ranked woman player -- ACBL's Jill Meyers -- credit for fast play as compared to the reasonably paced Dutch women. Marking only tempo breaks, the method allegedly used to measure time in a world championship final, miserably fails to account for fast play by any player.

From the Bull's Eye View, the minimum price of allowing a slow-play penalty to even *possibly* decide a world championship 128-board knockout match is the recording of exact time, which accurately reflects the total time elapsed by pair, not the recording of the number of tempo breaks (note that not even the length was recorded for sure, but total number of tempo breaks only), and most certainly slow-play penalties must not be allowed if the method keeps time by individual player, rather than by each pair.

If the officials are interjecting artificial constraints upon the result of the Bull's beloved bridge, then the judges have the highest of fiduciary responsibilities to be as exact as possible in keeping time.

In the unfortunate Venice Cup, the players up-

held their end of the deal and performed admirably and with distinguished decorum -- during and after the match.

The Dutch gesture of a rematch, accepted by the Americans, confirms that the Europeans prefer a more convincing victory and is a truly grand Dutch gesture to recover the luster of the Venice Cup. The Dutch gesture is a gesture of love for the game. *Vielen dank.*

Although the Bull would like to focus on the card play rather than the officiating, it was actually nice to have something to snort around about yesterday while #2 Nickell blew out original #14 Wolff-Morse, Ekeblad-Sutherland, and Adam Wildavsky partnered by a Golden Oldie, Stakgold; at the same time, Schwartz rode a large first half lead against Cayne-Burger, Seamon-Passell, and Lair-Smith.

Finally, into the final of the 2000 Vanderbilt:

The world's #1 ranked player, Bob Hamman, has not won the Vanderbilt since 1973, and indeed Nick n' Dick, HamWay and Meckwell will find themselves stuck 18 at half-time -- but in the second half Zia and Michael pass out 11 opposite 11 while Meckwell relay themselves to 5♦* in a 4-3 and Michael strikes back, making 1NT redoubled on a non-simultaneous double squeeze. Weinstein and Levin play almost flawlessly, but Meckwell are the world's hottest pair at the moment and the Heart of Soloway is the soul of a Lion.

multiple wins in the other two major team events on the ACBL calendar -- the Spingold Knockout Teams and the Reisinger Board-a-Match Teams -- plus two Bermuda Bowl titles.

In Wolff, the Nickell squad faced a former teammate. Wolff was Hamman's partner in most of the Nickell team's North American championships and in one of the Bermuda Bowl wins. Wolff was playing with Dan Morse, John Sutherland, Russ Ekeblad, Adam Wildavsky and Ivar Stakgold.

The Wolff team was never in the match. Nickell jumped out to a 50-22 lead in the first quarter, and followed that with a 58-3 second stanza. With Soloway in the lineup for the third quarter, Nickell poured it on, winning that session, 51-4. Wolff withdrew, trailing 159-29.

The Cayne-Schwartz match was not much more interesting. Schwartz, playing with Drew Casen, Zia, Michael Rosenberg, Robert Levin and Steve Weinstein, jumped out to a 44-12 lead after one quarter, adding another 48 IMPs in the second set to lead, 92-23, at the half.

Cayne (Chuck Burger, Mark Lair, Ron Smith, Mike Passell, Michael Seamon) fell further behind in the second half, losing the third quarter, 56-17. A fourth-quarter rally was too little, too late, and Cayne was ousted, 184-89.

The last time the Nickell team made it to the final of the Vanderbilt was in 1996, when they faced the team of Zia, Rosenberg, Seymon Deutsch, Martel and Lew Stansby. Zia's team prevailed, 146-109.

If you play 4♠ you will struggle on repeated trump leads, but you can succeed by forcing the defense to open up diamonds.

Look at 4♥ by West, however, on a club lead. You win this in hand perhaps, and now to succeed you must hold your heart losers to two. Lead the ♥A and then follow up with a low heart. That holds your losers to two if either defender has K-x or Q-x. Leading the ace and then the jack succeeds if someone has a doubleton 9 -- but that is only half as likely. (Of course, spoilsport North-South might lead the ♠Q and beat you on the ruff -- but that is too tough, I think.)

Mark Itabashi, West, and Nancy Passell, East, arrived at the aggressive 4♥ contract. The opening lead of the ♠ 2 went to the queen and ace. A low heart was led to the ace, and North cashed the ♠K before exiting with a low spade, which declarer took with the jack. Declarer can place both minor suit kings with North because of the bidding, so whether North is 5-3 or 4-4 in the minors does not matter.

Declarer now has to make the key play of cashing the ♥K, not playing low to the queen. Next declarer must lead the ♥9 to force out the jack. Declarer wins the diamond return and runs trumps, catching North in a guard squeeze. Eventually declarer scores the last three tricks with the ♣A-Q-x.

Note that North must shift to a club at trick two followed by another club later to break up the squeeze. Plus 420 proved to be an excellent score for East-West.
