This is part of a series of profiles of tournament directors working at NABCs.

In 1965, Mike Flader entered the University of Minnesota as an earnest student of sociology with a minor in child psychology. In his junior year, he

discovered bridge.

He finally graduated from college in 1986.

That's the way it is with a lot of people who end up with careers in our favorite game.

He was living the adage that "Life is what you do between bridge tournaments."

"That was me in the Seventies," he says. "I basically played as much as I could." He did meet some pretty good players on the tournament trail, including Howard Weinstein, Steve Garner, Dick Melson and Dave Lehman.

After bridge took over his life, Flader "kind of" dropped out of school, going to work for the U of M on the golf course in the summer and the ice rink in the winter. During that time, he became friendly with Herb Brooks, who made a name for himself as coach of the U.S. ice hockey team that stunned the world in 1980 by winning the gold medal in that sport at the Winter Olympic Games.

About that time, there was an opening in management at the Bridge Center in Minneapolis. Flader applied for the job and got it, launching his career in running bridge games. He has been

Topping the list of those receiving plaudits was Grand Life Master Zeke Jabbour, selected as ACBL's Honorary Member of the Year for 2007.

Other honorees included the late Dr. Joanne Clark, who had been nominated as Goodwill Member of the Year before her death this year. She was instrumental in the development of the Kona Bridge Club. Osofsky presented a plaque to Joanne's husband, Chuck, who said, "If Joanne were here, I know she would have appreciated this honor."

JUST FOR NEW PLAYERS

Be more competitive!

I hope you are having fun at this tournament. That's the most important thing, but let's face it, those who are winning are probably having even more fun. If you haven't won your share of masterpoints yet, it might be because you are not fighting hard enough for those partscores.

Take a look at your convention card from previous sessions. You do keep a private score, don't you? Keeping your own score makes it easier to go over the boards later using the hand records if you played in a pairs game.

The directors appreciate it, too, in case there are any questions on the scores. Team games don't have printed hand records, but it's imperative to keep score so you can go back and compare with your teammates. I remember one Swiss teams match where I played with a fellow I had never played with before and he took my convention card to see what we were playing. I had no place to keep score and he didn't write our scores down either, which I didn't discover until we went back to compare at the end of the round. It's quite embarrassing to have to go back to your opponents to find out what happened on each deal!

But I digress. Look at a simple auction that you probably hear frequently.

West	North	East	South
1♥	1♠	2♥	2♠

First, let's clear up one possible misunderstanding. Both East and South have shown hands worth from 6 to 9 or 10 high-card points. A raise of partner's suit to the two level shows a minimum responding hand with or without competition. Forget about free bids if you've ever heard about them. Bridge players today are aggressive.

How likely is it that the auction is over? Not very. When both sides have a fit, you almost always get a poor score for allowing your opponents to play in their fit on the two level.

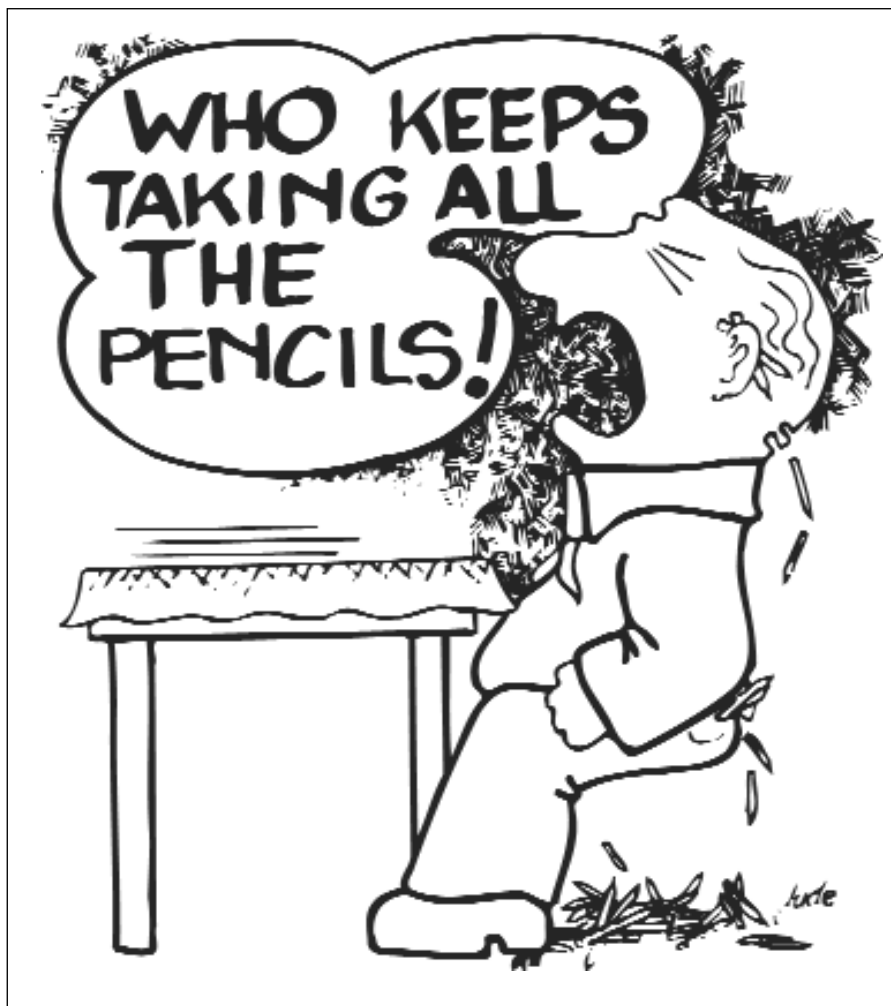
Either East or West might go on to 3♥. East's hand is already limited so there is no danger of West taking that as a game try. But what if opener bids 3♥? Don't bury your partner for being competitive. *Bidding three of our suit in competition is NOT a game try.* All we are trying to do is win the auction.

It is quite likely that both pairs have about half the points in the deck. Why should North-South get to play just because spades rank higher than hearts? They are at an advantage because East-West are forced a level higher. How might East-West benefit? 3♥ could make. But even if 3♥ goes down one, North-South were probably making 2♠.

If you are playing matchpoints, compare the scores from the perspective of East-West. If North-South play in 2♠, East-West score minus 110. If East-West play in 3♥, they might score plus 140 or minus 50 or minus 100 if vulnerable.

There is some risk of scoring worse if the opponents can double a vulnerable 3♥ bid and cause East-West to go minus 200, but it is often tough to know who can make what. Matchpoints is all about getting a plus score whenever possible and giving up the smallest minus score otherwise.

Say East-West do bid 3♥. Will North-South push on to 3♠ or will they sell out? If North-South are clairvoyant, they will push on when they can make 3♠ or even when they know East-



West can make 3♥. But who is clairvoyant? Fortunately for bridge players, the law of total tricks gives us a good guideline for situations like this. Once your opponents reach the three level, bid more only with extra distribution. The most common extra distributional feature you will have is an extra trump. So, if North overcalled with a six-card spade suit, North should bid 3♠. If South raised with four spades instead of the required three spades, South should bid 3♠. There are no guarantees, but if you follow this simple guideline you will come out on the winning end of more partscore fights. Get out there and fight!

All Pass

Opening lead: ♠K

Bidding commentary: West's 2♦ is a Michaels cuebid, showing 5-5 or 6-5 in the majors (either way) with typically 7-11 HCP. North has a choice of responses. One is to leap to 5♦, another is to cuebid 2♥, one of the opponent's known suits, showing a strong hand with diamonds. A third is to make a game-forcing jump in one of their suits to show a singleton in that suit with great support. There is no point in bidding hearts naturally when West is known to have at least five!

Lead commentary: Even though East has shown something in hearts, dummy has shown a singleton heart, so a spade lead stands out like a beacon.

Play commentary: The spade position on this deal is recurring. It is very likely that the suit is breaking 5-2. If so, by winning the second spade, you cut the spade communication between the East-West hands. Observe. You win the second spade, draw trumps and drive out the ♣A. East wins, but has no spade to return, so you can discard a spade on a club. If you win the first spade (ugh!), East can return a spade upon winning the ♣A, and now you lose two spades and a club. The general rule when playing a trump contract holding A-x-x facing x-x-x in the suit that has been led is to win the second round of the suit.

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“Tommy” Lum.

“He has dedicated a big part of his life to bridge,” Bennett said, “and he is the archetypical gentleman at the table.” Bennett recalled a big tournament he played with Lum, noting that their first session was very good and the second very bad, mostly because of his (Bennett’s) errors.. “Tommy’s demeanor never changed,” said Bennett, “and the worst thing he said to me was, ‘Bad luck.’”

Lum thanked the Goodwill Committee for the special honor, noting that bridge made it possible for him to meet people from all over the world “who have enriched my life. I am proud to be part of the committee.”

Osofsky noted the presence of several members of Team USA from last September’s inaugural Warren Buffett Cup in Dublin, where the Americans prevailed in a close match against a contingent from Europe, some of whose members were also on hand for the reception.

As the 2006 Fall NABC is the first with Jeff Johnston at the helm as meeting planner, Osofsky took the opportunity to provide some little-known info about Johnston, who this year was race director for the largest road race in Memphis (home of the ACBL), the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure 5K, which attracted 15,000 runners last month.

“We applaud you, Jeff,” Osofsky said. “We think you are a star.”

More player introductions were made, including four members of the American squad that won the World Junior Team Championship in Bangkok, Thailand, earlier this year – and the World University Games foursome who earned a silver medal in that competition in China.

NABC Chair Busaba Williams bade the group “Aloha – welcome to our beautiful island.”

Williams noted that there are about 170 volunteers who have been working at the NABC to assure that all players enjoy themselves, and she said she hopes it won’t be another 23 years before the ACBL schedules an NABC in Hawaii (the last one was in 1983).

Goodwill member Sue Kroning of Seaside OR was asked to talk about outgoing ACBL President Harriette Buckman, who spent the year spreading the word about bridge teachers and their important contribution to the game.

Kroning said Buckman attended the Seaside Regional earlier in the year, “and she spread so much good will . . .there were 26 teachers at a dinner (Buckman attended) and they all felt like she was their mother.”

Added Kroning: “No one listens better than Harriette.”

Reflecting on her year as ACBL president, Buckman said, “What a kick it has been.”

She reminded all in attendance to “honor your teachers. They are the ones who will bring your new members for the next five, ten, twenty years.”

Fun with the weak NT

Playing a weak (or mini) 1NT allows the users to try the occasional speculative shot. Take this deal from the first qualifying session of the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams.

When West opened 1NT (11-14) and North passed, East gambled that his opponents would have a sufficient major-suit fit to go with their 22-25 high-card points that they had either game or a high-scoring partscore available, so he raised to 3NT! That ended the auction and, after a low heart to the king, West had eight tricks for minus 50. Of course, West had a dream hand from East’s point of view.

This effort won the board. At the other table, North-South had collected only plus 100 from 4♦ doubled, missing their cold game, so something special was needed.

As it happened, the very next board gave East another chance to gamble.

After a pass by South, West again opened 1NT (1♥ might have been a better choice) and again East blasted 3NT, this time with hopes that it might make on a blind lead. But North-South were one of the pairs of young Swedish girls, and North doubled. East ran to 4♣, and we will never know if North would have followed through with a second double, as West bid 4♥ (he should not do so – East can redouble to invite West to the party, so 4♣ should be strictly to play) and South doubled. Three top diamonds, a spade to the ace and a club switch collected the ruff—three down for minus 500.

This time, North-South at the other table had done well. South opened 2♠, and East-West got to 3NT, doubled by North for minus 300. Had our East-West pair played 4♣ minus two, that would have been a win, 4♣ doubled down two a tie, but 4♥ doubled down three was a loss.

Weighed in the balance – and found wanting

Yet again with the *mea culpas*, you say? Yes, but this time it was an interesting mistake.

Dlr: East ♠ 4 3
Vul: Both ♥ A K J 8 7

At both tables on this deal from the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams, West overcalled a weak 2♠ opening with 3♦ (not recommended for those with weak stomachs) and played there.

Declarer at both tables went down 100 for a flat board.

I had my chances to be a hero. I led the ♥A and shifted to a spade to the king and ace. Back came a heart, and I cashed a third round of the suit for South to pitch the ♣8. At this point, I should have put on my counting hat. West almost certainly had four spades, three hearts, five diamonds and thus the singleton ♣A. So leading a club, as I did, accomplishes nothing. Best is to lead a fourth heart to let South pitch his second club. Declarer does best to ruff in dummy and pitch his ♣A, but when South ruffs the ♣K, all declarer can do is overruff and start a crossruff.

North ruffs the third spade with the ♦Q and returns a trump, and now declarer has only seven tricks.

Don't mess with me

Antonio Sementa is a double world champion – and he can read his opponents like a book, apparently.

Henner-Welland bid 6♥ to show the ♠Q and ♥K – and Sementa passed!

The Idiot's Finesse – first, pick your idiot

When I checked out a couple of deals from the Nail Life Master Open Pairs final, I saw two defenders attempt the same deceptive maneuver – with very different results. The first South was defending 3NT by East after a 2♠ opener by West (spades and a minor, 7-10 high-card points). A low heart went to the king and ace. When declarer played the ♠A, South smoothly dropped the ♠J. Now when declarer advanced the ♠8 and saw a low spade from South, he went up with the ♠Q – you have to get up very early in the morning to get up before Paul Marston.

When Marston cleared the spade suit, South mistakenly shifted to a diamond and declarer had nine tricks.

By contrast, Danny Sprung as South led a diamond against the same contract at another table. Declarer won the first diamond and led the ♠A. Sprung also dropped the ♠J, and declarer continued with his other spade to the 9 and 10 – the idiot's finesse since it assumes South has blown a trick by wasting his jack from J-10-x. Back came a diamond, and seven tricks was the limit.

The next deal (hands rotated) comes from the same session.

It is very easy – and very tempting – for West to let this contract through. West leads the ♣A and ♣K and sees East discard. What could be more natural than to cash the ♣Q and lead a fourth club? Not good enough.

Declarer ruffs in dummy, cashes the ♥A then ruffs a diamond to hand and draws trumps. With the aid of the singleton ♠Q, declarer has 10 tricks.

Lynn Deas did very well at trick three to shift to a trump, Now, though declarer can make the contract double dummy, he could not find a way home at the table.

But note what happens if East makes the “natural” discard of a spade at trick two. After drawing trumps and leading a spade to king and a spade back to the 10 and jack. This ending is reached:

Declarer can help. Put yourself in the South seat for a moment. What would you be likely to play from dummy holding the following combinations?

- ♠J x

With the first three holdings you would most likely play the queen from dummy. With the last three, you would most likely play the 3.

Okay, now you are East again. You play the ♠K because you know that declarer probably holds d, e or f from the list above. If declarer holds d or e, the play probably will not be material to the final result. If declarer holds f, your teammates will be proud to compare their plus 630 with your plus 200. The full deal:

teaching bridge since the mid-Seventies.

Flader worked his first tournament, a sectional, in 1989, becoming a full-time ACBL TD five years later.

Flader says he owes a lot of his development as a director to mentoring he received from Ron Johnson, Chris Patrias and Larry Brobst. The latter, he says, "is the hardest worker I ever saw."

Now an associate national director, Flader took over the Ruling the Game column for the ACBL Bridge Bulletin several years ago, volunteering for the job after the previous author, Brian Moran, died.

"It's nice to be in contact with the members to help them understand the laws better," Flader says.

In 1992, Flader married Jill, one of his bridge students. "It's the best thing that ever happened to me," he says. They live in Eagan MN with their two dogs, Casey and Trump.

Early in his bridge-playing days, Flader was a frequent winner on the tournament circuit, and he still plays as much as he can, given a busy schedule that includes a lot of bowling (he has had a 200-plus average for 35 years). In the spring of 2005, he and Warren Foss of Omaha NE came in 11th overall in the national IMP Pairs.

Soft-spoken as a rule, Flader does allow that his bridge results have been better this year, with three regional victories "just when I thought I was washed up."

No matter what, he says, there's always the TD gig: "I love my job. I love the travel and interacting with bridge players. They are intellectually stimulating."

Sidney led the ♠8. Declarer played the jack and I encouraged with the 7. Declarer led hearts from the top, as Sidney held off until the third round, while I discarded low cards in both minors.

When Sidney finally won the ♥K, he knew that declarer had the ♠Q and ♣A, so he did not have the ♦A Q. He shifted to the ♦K, therefore, setting up our third trick before declarer could knock out the ♠A. Surprisingly, holding the contract to 10 tricks was worth 80% of the matchpoints.

A small slam in hearts is an excellent contract on this deal from the second qualifying session of the Mitchell Open Board-a-Match Teams (hands rotated).

We seemed to have got lucky on this one when we stopped in game. In the Acol style, where 2♥ was non-forcing, South was completely maximum, and North could have splintered with 3♠, which would have got us to slam (I was South).

After a spade to the queen and ace, I cashed the ♥A and was delighted to see the 4-0 split. It was easy to make 11 tricks by playing on diamonds now, throwing spades from hand, and plus 450 had some potential to be a winning board.

But most likely auctions to slam attract a club lead – for instance, where North does show the spade shortage – and our teammates duly led a club against 6♥. After either a club or spade continuation, declarer has the communication to draw trumps then run the diamonds for 12 tricks, and we lost the board, so justice was done for our poor auction.

After a club to the ace, a diamond switch will beat 6♥ as declarer can no longer get to the long diamonds after drawing trumps – but could anyone find the defense?

Of course, Deep Throat, excuse me, Deep Finesse, assures us that 6♥ is unbeatable, but DF plays double dummy. After a club lead and diamond switch, declarer must win the queen, take a first-round finesse of the ♥9, take a spade ruff, throw two remaining losers on diamonds, unblock the ♥K and cross to the ♣K to run the trumps.

Rae Dethlefsen

Rae Dethlefsen of Reston VA died Oct. 21 of respiratory failure. Dethlefsen, a Gold Life Master and member of the National Goodwill Committee, was a familiar face at NABCs, and was often a proxy to the Board of Governors. She was active in District 6 governance. Dethlefsen won many regional tournaments and had several top 10 finishes in NABC events. The District 6 Board has voted to name all District Grand National Team events in her honor.

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both cards of a partnership must be identical and include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director. Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

Hawaii 1983: A look back

It has been 23 years since Hawaii hosted a North American Bridge Championship. In 1983, the Spring NABC took place at the Hilton Hawaiian Village, and 11,697 tables were in play. At that time, it was the third largest Spring NABC ever (behind New York, 1968 and Pasadena, 1977).

The ♦K went to North's ace, and West ruffed the club return. West was able to get out with a diamond to the queen, but that didn't help. Dummy had the ♠A 8 left and West had the ♠J 7. Siebert led a club and West was the victim of a trump coup. Making five earned Siebert a fine score.

Declarer then cashed the ♦A, preparatory to endplaying East, but Tornay discarded the ♥Q!

Next came the ♥A and then the ♥K, and declarer was ready with his endplay. He led the ♠8 from dummy, but Tornay was having none of that — he knew he'd have to give up the last two tricks if he took his ♠J. So he played the ♠5 under the 8! And there was declarer — in dummy with all hearts. Stayman of course won with his ♥10, and his diamonds were good for the rest of the tricks and a one-trick set.

He ruffed a club and a spade, then led another club on which he pitched a heart as West ruffed. But Griscom already had eight tricks on his side, and was sure to get another with West on lead and the ♦K in dummy and three to the jack in hand. Making 3♦ was worth 12 of a possible 14 matchpoints.

It looked to Bergen like all of his cards were working, so he bid 2NT showing interest in game and asking more about East's hand. North chimed in with 3♣ and Stauber's double showed a good hand and some clubs. South should have passed, but decided to show the diamond suit which Bergen was happy to double.

Dummy won the opening spade lead and led a club, won by Stauber who led another spade to dummy. Another club was led to East who now played a heart through. Bergen won the jack and led back the ♥K, declarer winning the ace. South now played a diamond to dummy, cashed the ♠A pitching a heart, and played a high club pitching his last heart as Bergen ruffed in.

Dummy had the lone ♦J and three clubs. South had the ♦K Q 7 3 and Bergen had a spade and the ♦A 8 6. When Bergen exited with a low diamond, declarer had to let dummy's jack win as he couldn't afford to overtake. Now when he came off with a club, if he ruffed with the ♦7, Bergen can overruff with the 8. If he ruffed with an honor, Bergen could discard his spade.

This was an important trick, setting the opponents for 300 instead of 100 and gave E-W 12 matchpoints out of 12.
