On Thursday evening, the Grand National Teams Flight A squad from District 8 left the playing area thinking about the pair games on Friday. They had gone over the card in their match with District 21 a couple of times and just couldn't find enough IMPs to overcome the 10-IMP deficit.

Well after midnight, District 8 team captain Michael Halvorsen was perplexed to learn that his team had advanced to the semifinal round of the event. He couldn't figure it out.

It all came clear Friday morning.

It turned out that the key was board 7 (both vulnerable). When the teams compared, it appeared board 7 was a push because the score was plus 620 at both tables.

It didn't dawn on anyone that the plus 620s were for North-South and East-West, respectively. Halvorsen had opened 4♥ on eight hearts to the AKJ10 and scored 10 tricks. At the other table, the player holding that hand had also opened 4♥, but the next player made a takeout double and his partner bid 4♠, also making.

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Districts 9 and 16 to vie for GNT prize

Teams captained by Jim Mahaffey (District 9) and Malcolm Brachman (16) will face each other in the final of the Grand National Teams, Championship Flight. Brachman won a close contest against a District 19 squad in a match not settled until an appeals committee became involved.

Mahaffey is playing with Gary Cohler, Michael Seamon, Eric Rodwell, Jeff Meckstroth and Barnet Shenkin. Their opponents on Friday withdrew after three quarters. Brachman's squad is Bart Bramley, Sidney Lazard, Mike Passell and Eddie Wold.

David Kent of Lake Mary FL and Jeffrey Hand of Casselberry FL had two huge games to take a 32-point lead after the two qualifying sessions of the Life Master Pairs yesterday. Since top on a board was 25, this represents a lead of well over a full board.

North led the ♠3 and Riding put in the 10. Declarer, imagining that a heart might have to be lost to North, ducked. South then cashed the ♠A to claim a complete top against a row of plus 680s.

Great reinforcement

My presentation at the American Bridge Teachers Association conference was on jump bidding, and I was suggesting that weak jump responses to opening bids is a bad idea.

After the presentation, Sandy Stevens, one of the teachers, came up to me with a deal to reinforce my prejudice. She had encountered this in a regional KO last week. This deal helped her win the event.

She held

♠ Q J 9 8 7 6 4 ♥ - ♦ 7 6 5 4 ♣ J 3 and her partner opened 1♥. Not having a weak jump response available, she bid 1♠ and heard 4♦ (splinter, slam try) in response.

Most people would have looked at their four points and signed off in 4♠. Sandy liked her seven-card suit enough to try 5♠ (not bad, from a hand that might have passed on the first round). Partner bid 6♠ holding

♠ A K 3 2 ♥ K J 7 5 3 ♦ - ♣ A Q 6 2, and Sandy made 7♠ when the club finesse worked.

In the other room? Sandy's hand made a weak jump response of 2♠ - and the opening bidder passed! Plus 230 as opposed to minus 1460!

Barbara Sion

Barbara Sion, a Diamond Life Master and winner of three major bridge championships, died of cancer June 15 in Las Vegas. She was 61.

Sion, who survived two previous bouts with cancer, battled the disease for more than a dozen years. She was a member of the winning squad in the Mixed Board-a-Match Teams (then the Master Mixed Teams) in 1984 and in 1994. She and Suzy Burger won the Life Master Women's Pairs in 1996. They were second on the national Women's Pairs in 1997.

Renee Mancuso, a former teammate of Sion's, said her friend was well respected by all who knew her. "Barbara was just a lovely person," said Mancuso.

Sion leaves a sister, Heather Hendren, and a brother, Michael Hendren.

Variations on a theme

Squeezes are nothing special, but the variations when declarer uses a losing card to finish off one opponent are among the rarer types.

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East led the ♥9 to the jack, queen and ace. A club to the queen lost to the king, and West switched to a trump, ducked to East, who played a second heart. When declarer played the ♥8, West would have done better to duck, but he covered and declarer won the trick, cashed the ♣A and ruffed a club. Now declarer drew trumps, cashed one more spade, crossed to dummy with the ♦A and played a diamond.

At that point, West was down to the ♥6 3 and ♣10 and was squeezed by the losing diamond. Declarer ended with 11 tricks.

Said Haddad

Said Haddad, a former North American champion and a contemporary of Charles Goren and Alvin Roth, died June 24 in Fairview NC. He was 88.

Haddad won the national Mixed Pairs in 1954 playing with Betty Windley.

A World War II veteran, Haddad served as a demolitions expert and later owned a demolitions company. He was in real estate development at the time of his death. He divided his time between North Carolina and Miami Beach FL.

He leaves a son, Paul Haddad of Miami FL; a daughter, Christine Carr of McLean VA, and four stepchildren.

Ernie Clinton

Longtime ACBL tournament director Ernie Clinton died in April in Fort Myers FL. The popular director began directing part-time in the early Sixties while he pursued his career as a chemist. Clinton and his wife, Kay, took up bridge in the Forties, and when they progressed to tournament play, Ernie's duties as a director didn't allow him to earn masterpoints as rapidly as Kay, so she was the first to achieve the coveted Life Master status.

Ernie finally became an LM while playing with his daughter. This became a source of family amusement because Ernie refused to identify his young blonde partner while his fellow directors kept asking, "Where's Kay?"

Clinton loved directing and watching young Michigan (and later, Florida) players evolve into national and world champions. He was a veteran of WWII and is interred at Arlington National Cemetery. He is survived by his wife, two daughters and three grandchildren. The family has requested that any donations be directed to the National Parkinson's Foundation in Ernie's name.

Patron Member, Cohen score well in pair game

When Patron Member John Dockray won the drawing to play with Larry Cohen in the Educational Foundation Stratified Open Pairs at the Summer NABC, he knew he was in for a pleasant game.

It was also worth a section top, one of the better games Cohen has had in the opening-night pair game.

Dockray, of Villanova (suburban Philadelphia), is retired from the pipe distribution business. He learned bridge while living in Houston TX, playing with the legendary Bobby Nail during the Sixties.

When he moved to the Philadelphia area in 1966, he pretty much gave up the game. In the early Nineties, he started in again. Now he and his wife, Edie, are regulars at their local bridge clubs. Both are certified bridge teachers, and John has taught a women's team in a bridge league at the Overlook Golf Club. He and Edie play together once a week and with others another couple of times.

His game with Cohen featured a couple of swinging deals, both of which produced cold tops for the pair.

This was the first.

East's aggressive preempt (given the vulnerability) did not pay off for his side. Cohen's aggressive leap to the club slam did pay off, especially when Dockray converted to 6NT. With the ♥Q dropping on the first round, Dockray had 13 tricks – and 12 out of 12 matchpoints.

Later in the game, there were more fireworks.

Dockray's bid of 2♥ was creative. To be charitable, West's double of 2♥ was optimistic.

West started with his singleton club, won win dummy with the ace. Dockray immediately played a heart to his 10. West won the ace and played the ♠K. Dockray took the ♠A in dummy and played a heart to his jack. The ♥K picked up the opposing trumps, and Dockray was later able to lead a spade toward his jack for two overtricks and a score of plus 670.

Dockray ended the evening with a good feeling. "Larry is just a joy to play with," he said.

Edie, Dockray said, kibitzed the game with Cohen and had a lot of questions during the session. Said Dockray: "He answered them all."

USA Team 1 named for World Juniors

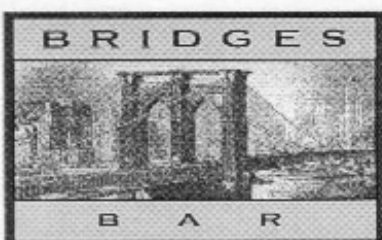
The United States Bridge Federation has named 2003 Bronze Medalists Joe Grue, John Hurd, John Kranyak, and Joel Wooldridge as USA Team 1. Team 1 will augment a pair from the 2004 Junior Swiss Pairs to round out the team. Bob Rosen will be the non-playing captain (npc).

USA Team 2 will be determined by a Swiss Pairs event July 17 and 18 during the tournament here in New York. The pairs placing first and second will become USA 2 (provided they are not one of the pairs selected by USA 1.) If either the first or second-place pair is augmented by USA 1, then the pair placing third will be offered a place on USA Team 2. The team will then select an npc, and after consultation with the npc, the team will augment another pair from any pair participating in the Swiss Pairs event.

Participants must be born in 1979 or later, citizens of the United States, and ACBL members of good standing. Both teams will represent the United States in the 2005 World Youth Team Championship.

Convention card reminder

Each player is required to have a convention card filled out legibly and on the table throughout a session. Both partnership cards must be identical. Both must include the first and last names of each member of the partnership.

If a director determines that neither player has a substantially completed card, the partnership may play only the Standard American Yellow Card and may use only standard carding. This restriction may be lifted only at the beginning of a subsequent round after convention cards have been properly prepared and approved by the director.

Further, the partnership will receive a 1/6 board matchpoint penalty for each board played, commencing with the next round and continuing until the restriction is lifted. In IMP team games, penalties shall be at the discretion of the director.

If the director determines the partnership has at least one substantially completed convention card but has not fully complied with ACBL regulations, the director may give warnings or assign such penalties as he deems appropriate under the circumstances.

The objective of these warnings and penalties is the encouragement of full compliance with ACBL regulations.

New York, Summer 1974

It's been 30 years since New York hosted a North American Bridge Championship and Chairman Ira Zippert issued a "welcome to the thousands of bridge players who have come to New York for the 1974 Summer Nationals."

Frank Merblum got an opportunity to make a devastating defensive holdup in the Master Mixed Teams, and he was equal to the occasion.

The 3NT game looks simple enough: three hearts (four with a heart opening lead), three clubs, four spades (with the Q-10 dropping doubleton) and probably a diamond trick.

West led a heart, won by dummy's 10, and declarer called for the ♣K. West took her ace and led another heart to the king.

Declarer cashed her three club tricks, finishing in her hand. On the last club, Merblum (East) discarded a low diamond.

To declarer, this seemed a chance to set up a diamond trick. She led the ♦J and passed it – and Merblum ducked! Certain the ♦Q was favorably placed, declarer next finessed the ♦10 and watched as Merblum won the queen, the ace and two more diamonds to set the contract.

It happened in the Swiss Teams: a director took the microphone and announced that an automobile claim check had been turned in – license number so and so. Dead silence.

Turning the ticket over, the director said, "Oh, there's a bridge hand written on the back. You hold ace-king third, ace-king-queen eighth, stiff, stiff."

Immediately a young man came dashing to the front, waving his arms. "It's mine, it's mine and I made it too – four hearts."

Gerry Michaud and Bobby Nail won the Life Master Pairs. This deal shows Michaud playing a tough slam.

At first glance, Michaud looks out of luck because the ♦K is offside. West, however, led a club and East won his ace and returned a club. That's all Michaud needed. He won the ♣K and cashed all his major-suit winners, reaching this position:

When Michaud led the last heart from dummy, East pitched a spade and declarer let go of a low diamond. But what was West to do?

If he threw the ♣Q, dummy's ♣J would be good so West shed the ♦J. Michaud still had to decide who had the ♦K but he guessed correctly, leading to his ace and dropping the king. That was worth 14.5 out of 15 matchpoints in the final.

When you have K-x-x in one hand and A-x-x in the other, it often matters where you win the first trick. Take a look at this deal played by Barbara Saltsman of Montreal.

The 4♦ bid was Swiss (a relatively balanced hand too strong in high cards to raise directly to game) but Saltsman wasn't interested in going beyond game.

She won the ♣Q opening lead with her ace and set the stage to make her contract. She cashed the ♠A K and the top diamonds, finding the suit split. Next she cashed the ♣K and led the last diamond.

It would have done East no good to ruff, so he discarded but that didn't save him. Saltsman ruffed a club to her hand and exited with her last trump. East, stuck with the lead and down to all hearts, was forced to give up the game-going trick to dummy's ♥K.

Peter Pender, playing with Grant Baze in the Life Master Pairs, talked declarer into taking the wrong line of play.

South opened 2♠ and played there. Baze (West) started with the ♣K and when Pender (East) played the ♣2, Baze shifted to a heart.

Pender won his ace and continued hearts. Baze led a third round of hearts and declarer ruffed. Now declarer led the ♣Q and Baze won his ace. He continued with a fourth round of hearts and Pender pitched the ♦10.

Declarer eyed this somewhat suspiciously but led a diamond to dummy's ace preparatory to a

trump finesse. This time Pender followed with the ♦Q.

No doubt declarer had planned to take two trump finesses but now he figured he was in dummy for the last time. So he finessed to his ♠Q – which was successful.

It was also unsuccessful, however, because Pender now collected a trump trick to hold declarer to eight tricks – and an excellent score for Pender and Baze.

Overheard at the Hospitality Desk:

- What time does the 7 o'clock side game start?

After the auction went 1NT-3NT, Bill Passell (West) was on opening lead with

Note the bidding. Gould passed at his first turn but the 1NT response was forcing and Gould knew he'd get another chance.

When the 2♥ rebid was passed back to him, Gould tried a cuebid. His partner realized he had a giant with all his values in the right places, so he also cuebid.

Gould got the message and leaped to 6♣. Shepherd tried 6♦ in case partner was bidding on a two-suiter, and Gould bid the grand slam in clubs.

After the lead of the ♥A, Gould ruffed and claimed his contract. He would draw trumps, cash the ♦A and throw his two low spades on dummy's ♦K Q.

At the other table, the auction stopped in 6♣ and Goldberg collected 14 IMPs – important IMPs since the team won the match by only 10.

Since that time, Starzec, a resident of Tokyo from October of last year, has picked up quite a bit of actual – that is to say, non-bridge – Japanese. In fact, at the ACBL Hall of Fame dinner Thursday night, Starzec spoke to three Japanese table mates in their native tongue. They were impressed.

Starzec landed in Japan because her husband, Len, is an engineering manager for Exxon Mobil, and he was transferred to Tokyo. She came to New York as a speaker at the American Bridge Teachers Association meeting. She briefed the group on her bridge adventures in the land of the rising sun.

Starzec says she is still amazed at the way bridge is played at the Yotsuya Bridge Center in Tokyo, about 15 minutes' walk from her apartment in the Prudential Tower. The club is located above the headquarters of the Japan Contract Bridge League.

“They can play 24 boards in two and a half hours,” she says. “They move on their own, and there are no director calls. The room is totally quiet. The only sound you hear is when a pair arrives at a table and is greeted with ‘hello.’ You could hear a pin drop during the games.”

The first time she played, Starzec recalls, she was the only non-Japanese person in the club. “Everyone welcomed me,” she says.

Starzec has traveled the world as the wife of an oil company executive. Originally from Chicago, she has lived in a wide variety of places: Paris, Saudi Arabia, Indonesia and, just to keep her humble, Beaumont TX.

She took up bridge in Denver in the Seventies. “Everyone I knew played bridge,” she recalls, “and I wanted to fit in.” She started duplicate in the early Eighties. Bridge, she says, “has been a lifesaver in all the places I’ve lived.”

Starzec took ACBL’s Teacher Accreditation Program in 1987 while living in Indonesia. In that country, which has fielded some very strong international teams through the years, she played against some of the best players. While there, she became a certified director and actually ran a duplicate game in Jakarta.

For seven years she was ACBL’s field representative out of Houston as well as a TAP trainer. She wrote the unit growth seminar manual still in use.

Her husband was transferred to Japan in the spring of 2003, but she didn’t join him until that fall because of ACBL responsibilities. Starzec says she has thoroughly enjoyed the new country and the cordiality of all the people she has met.

Before Starzec left for Japan, Toyoko Shibutani, who lives in District 3, gave Starzec some names of Japanese bridge players to contact. Starzec ended up playing with Yoko Yagasaki, who is also in New York.

The JCBL, Starzec says, has about 6800 members, the vast majority of whom play a five-card major system. Of the 95% who play five-card majors, 80% of them play a 2/1 game force system. Players who learn bridge through the JCBL go directly into duplicate. “There is very little rubber bridge in Japan,” she says.

Starzec doesn’t know how much longer she will be in Japan. It’s her husband’s final overseas assignment before retirement. They could be there just a few more months – or another six years. She does know that in September, she will be teaching bridge in Japan, a job she is looking forward to.

Starzec remains impressed with the Japanese culture and the politeness of its bridge population. “Our players,” she says, “could take some lessons from them.”
