Last-minute partners win 99er Pairs

Ray Wise and Janet Kay, who formed their partnership the morning of the National 99er Pairs, had a monster game in the first session of the National 99er Pairs to win going away. Second in the event were sisters Kim and Kathy Gilman, who posted their own big game in the second session.

Wise is an attorney who lives in Valrico FL and works in Tampa. Kay, a retired clinical psychologist, is from Leesburg FL.

They met the morning of the game, both looking for partners, "and we decided we would do well together," said Wise. Was he ever right.

In the first session, they posted a 176.07 on a 120 average – 73.36%. They followed it with a 60.17% game in the afternoon to win by more than two boards.

For Kay, the win was the culmination of a satisfying series in bridge competition. She has

'It's exhilarating to be a director!'

What's it like to work as a tournament director for the first time at an NABC?

"Exhilarating!" breathed Diane Beyer of Orland Park IL.

"Great!" echoed Kevin Perkins of Austin TX.

"It's incredible," Beyer went on. It's so much more exciting than playing."

Beyer decided she wanted to be a tournament director the very first time she played duplicate. She started playing four years ago and became a Life Master in less than three years.

Perkins has been playing longer – he started in 1990. He began directing club games in 2000 and moved up to tournaments last year.

Both were extremely busy for the first four days of this tournament. They, along with a few others, took a director training course three sessions a day from Saturday through Tuesday.

"It was interesting but tough," said Perkins.

"They would send one of us out of the room for a few minutes while the rest of us came up with an irregularity for him to handle. When he came back, we would be sitting around the table. We'd get aggressive and irritable, and the director would have to handle it. He had to control the situation while he made his ruling. It was a great

Onstott had no trouble working out what North had in mind for the defense – he accurately pictured a club void to his left. Indeed, at the other table, where the contract was 6♥ by East, South led a club, ruffed by North, to hold declarer to 12 tricks.

Plus 2220 was good for a 13-IMP gain. Had Onstott passed 7♥ doubled and South made the lead Onstott expected, it would have been a 17-IMP loss.

learning experience. Afterwards we would consult, talking over the ins and outs of the problem."

Beyer agreed. "It was intense, but we learned a lot and honed our talents."

Directors usually are assigned either to a computer to input scores or to the floor to handle rulings and disturbances. "I much prefer walking the floor to punching keys," said Beyer. "I really enjoy being on the floor, and I just love laws and rules."

Both enjoy the reception they have received from their fellow directors. "They become like family very quickly," said Beyer.

"I like the complexities and the variety," said Perkins, who also prefers the floor. "It's wonderful to see what happens behind the scenes. I love seeing how everything works – how everything goes together."

Perkins got interested in bridge in college. He was part of a group who liked to play games, but everything changed when they tried bridge. "The other games were too easy. I loved the challenge that bridge offered."

Beyer grew up around party bridge at home, but she took up the game herself when she joined a group of women taking bridge lessons at the country club. The game grabbed her right away. "I wouldn't say that I'm a competitive person, but I guess a lot of other people would."

Bee Ronske and Jill Lundberg, who have been teaching bridge in the school for two years.

"They're amazing," Lundberg said. "They remember everything. And the bonus is that now all the parents want to learn." Her grandson, Dalton, 7, is one of her students.

Ten-year-old Andrew Schutte confirmed that he had sat his folks down for a lesson, lamenting they weren't quite ready for the game.

"My parents play spades and I'm trying to teach them bridge, but they just don't get the bidding," he said.

The students enjoy the game for the same reasons cited by other players.

"It's fun," said Elaine Saso, 10, adding quickly, "and it's educational."

"Yeah, it's educational," added Tyler Woodhull. "You just don't realize it because it's so much fun."

Bidding and play was spirited if somewhat hesitant. "Now play the ace, right?" said Dalton, simultaneously instructing the dummy while receiving a confirming nod from a kibitzer. A few tricks later, he had made a small slam. "I won 12," he exclaimed. "Sweet!" (Lessons on gloating can wait for now.)

The youngsters played 10 deals in a home-style

West led a diamond to the ace, and declarer crossed to dummy with a trump to ruff the other diamond. He went back to dummy and led the singleton heart. East played the jack, and declarer not unnaturally decided to duck. East led another heart, ruffed in dummy. Declarer came back to hand with a trump and led another heart to ruff, and down came the ace from West.

Declarer now had a reasonable count on the hand. West had one spade and three hearts. He had either five or six diamonds, so he also had to have either three or four clubs. So, following the odds, he took the club finesse against West – and lost his slam. This was the full deal:

See why declarer got the count wrong? Magy Mohan, a professional player from Mexico, had falsecarded the ♥A on the third round of the suit, deliberately setting up declarer's ♥K and giving him a chance to go wrong on the count as well. She knew a discard on the ♥K wouldn't help declarer – he had to get rid of two clubs from dummy, not one.

What an incredible falsecard! Who would ever read West for four hearts when she plays the ace? How did Magy ever think of that play? One player wasn't surprised – her husband, John Mohan. "She's a great player, and almost nobody knows it," he said.

Swiss, changing teammates for each round. All ended up with their first masterpoints, with .70 red for the winners, playing three-handed: Elaine, Safeena Kassoo, 10; and Victoria Edstrom, 8.

The students all received free tee shirts and cards, and Chief Tournament Director Rick Beye donated their \$5 student memberships.

Lundberg said that the Internet has been essential to sustaining the students' interest in the game. "Now that you can play bridge on the computer, they can play with each other at home," she said. Ames led 82-55 with 32 deals to be played, and Rosenkranz wiped out the entire lead to get to even with a quarter to go. This deal helped Rosenkranz to a double-digit swing.

John Koch also led a low club to start the defense, but Neil Chambers went up with the ace, played the ♥K, tempting a cover if North had the ♥A, ruffed the heart, then cashed the top two spades, pitching a low club from dummy. Declarer then ruffed a low spade, and when North's queen fell, Chambers ruffed another heart to hand and played the ♠J, pitching dummy's last club. There was nothing North-South could do, and Chambers was home with his game. That was 10 IMPs to Rosenkranz.

On the final deal of the third quarter, Rosenkranz pulled even with a game swing.

Reygadas started with the ♣Q, taken by Mary Egan with dummy's ace. She played the ♥J at trick two, and Rosenkranz covered. Egan won the ace and played a spade to the ace and a second spade to the queen and king. Reygadas then exited with a low diamond, and again Egan rose with the ace and

played a heart to the 10 and queen. A diamond was returned to the king in dummy and Egan cashed the ♣A and ruffed a club, then played a heart to dummy's 9.

Egan had given herself every chance to make the contract, and if Reygadas had been forced to win trick 11, she would have succeeded as he would have been on lead with the ♠10 7 while Egan held the ♠Q 9. It was not to be, however. Rosenkranz won, and his partner could not be prevented from making his ♠10 for one down.

Schermer and Chambers won the board for the team in the bidding.

John Schermer's 3♣ was a checkback bid, and he went on to bid the game in notrump despite finding out about the eight-card spade fit.

Koch led a low diamond to the 10 and ace, and Chambers played the ♠A and a second spade from hand, inserting dummy's 9 when Koch showed out. Ames continued with a diamond, ducked by declarer, who won the third round of diamonds with the king.

A spade to dummy's queen knocked out the king, and declarer won the ♣A when Ames got out with a sneaky ♣J. Chambers then floated the ♥J to North's queen and won the club continuation. When the second heart finesse worked, Chambers had nine tricks and plus 600. The teams were tied at 118.

On this deal from the fourth quarter, Bruce Ferguson tried to muddy the water, but Beery and Egan shrugged off the obfuscation for a slam swing.

Ferguson's 4♣ bid was ostensibly asking for key cards, of which Roger Bates had none. Ferguson signed off in 4♠, but Egan didn't fall for the bluff, and Beery picked up on the nonsense as well, cuebidding to let Egan pick the slam. Actually, 13 tricks are available in either minor or in notrump, so Ferguson achieved his goal to a degree at least, so there was potential for a gain. It didn't work out that way.

Koch's single raise to 4♠ accomplished what Ferguson's bluff failed to do as Schermer and Chambers each took a very conservative view of his hand and the excellent slam was missed.

That was 13 IMPs to Ames.

With two boards to go, Ames had a 17-IMP lead, which was fortunate for them considering

what happened on the next-to-last deal.

This fine contract was cold, and Chambers quickly chalked up plus 920, losing only a heart. At the other table, there was an accident. Egan and Beery missed the slam, stopping instead in 3NT from the East side.

It was obvious to Beery when he saw dummy that they had missed 6♦, and in his tired state he fixated on that contract. The result was a disaster.

Beery won the spade opening lead in the West hand, and he played the top diamonds from dummy, blocking the suit. He then floated the ♥9 to South's king, and when South continued with a club, Beery won the ace and claimed, stating that he would "ruff" his losers – not possible in notrump. The result was three down for minus 150 and a 14-IMP swing to Rosenkranz, now within 3 IMPs of pulling out a win.

On the final deal, South played a diamond partscore at both tables. Ferguson made 10 tricks in one room while Koch was held to nine in the other, a loss of 1 IMP. Ames was through to the final by 2

Facts: Upon inquiry after the 2NT bid, North explained that it was for the minors. After the alerted 3♦ bid, North said that South was showing the red suits.

Director's Ruling: The director ruled that since passing 3♣ doubled was not a logical alternative, the result would not be adjusted, even though there was unauthorized information available to South.

The Appeal: Only East attended the hearing. East's contention was that a pass of 3♣ doubled was a logical alternative: if North's 3♣ bid showed clubs, then South had a good hand for playing clubs. Furthermore, East said that his double of 3♣ was a card-showing double, not a penalty double. Accordingly, according to East, South could not tell from the auction that North did not have a hand of a 4-2-1-6 pattern. Hence, on the basis of the auction, pass was a logical alternative.

The Decision: The committee tried to discover what the North-South partnership understanding was. From what the committee could determine from the screening director and East, N-S had neither system notes nor convention card marks indicating the precise meaning of the 2NT bid. If South felt that his 2NT bid was clearly for red suits per partnership understanding, then North's explanation of 2NT constituted UI for South. If this were the case, then passing 3♣ might have been a logical alternative. However, at the pre-hearing screening, South stated that he always meant to bid

3♦ to show the red suits if North were to bid 3♣. Therefore, the committee found that passing 3♣ doubled was not a logical alternative. The committee also felt that it was unlikely that North would have a club suit worth bidding at this point since he did not pre-empt clubs over West's opening club bid.

The committee asked its chairperson to counsel the N-S pair about full disclosure of their agreements since this appeal would not have been made if North had said that the 2NT bid was for the minors but correctable to being for the red suits.

Dissent (by Aaron Silverstein): I believe that without evidence that the conventional agreement for N-S is that with red suits they show minors and convert (which the offending side never even claimed), the 3♣ bid must be treated as natural. For that reason, the contract should be changed to 3♣ doubled, down eight. Without the explanation it is possible that the final contract would have been 3♣ doubled. On a trump lead down eight is the natural result.

South's testimony that he would always convert 3♣ to 3♦ is self-serving and should be discounted. No matter how much one believes and respects South, his professed state of mind is irrelevant.

play six. We couldn't sit on the sidelines and wonder what was happening." Ames is semi-retired from his medical products company. He also teaches bridge and is a director - and at the Orlando NABC he even did some caddying, working the second final session of the Marsha May Sternberg Women's Board-a-Match Teams. "I did a great job," he said proudly.

The win was the first North American championship for all four.

Egan and Beery are in business together in Lincoln NE as marketing consultants. Until recently, Beery was president and chief executive officer of an insurance company and Egan was his assistant. He sold his stock and signed a non-compete consulting agreement with the company, and now he and Egan play a lot of bridge and golf.

Koch, of St. Cloud MN, is an attorney specializing in civil practice. He and Ames first played together in the late Sixties in the President's Pairs at the Spring NABC in Cleveland. "We came in fifth," says Ames, "and we were really proud of ourselves."

Along the way to the Senior KO victory, the Ames team knocked off a series of favored teams. First there was the Carolyn Lynch team, which included many-time world champion Bobby Wolff and Dan Morse. Ames took a huge lead and survived a furious late charge by Lynch to win by 2 IMPs.

Next up was John Onstott and company, another all-star squad. Ames, trailing by 8 IMPs heading into the final set, rallied for a 131-125 victory.

There was no relief for the foursome, however, as they faced the veteran George Rosenkranz lineup next. After 48 boards, the match was tied, but Ames put together a string of results good enough to withstand a 14-IMP loss on the next-to-last deal as they moved on with a 152-150 win.

In the final, it was the Bennett team standing in their way. Bennett's squad was essentially the same one that won the Senior Swiss Teams in New York last summer: Fran Dickman, Chris Larsen, Mike Shuman, Gene Simpson and Bruce Noda. All but Larsen were on the team in New York.

Bennett jumped out to a 38-21 lead, but Ames cut it back to 8 IMPs at the half, only to see Ames move ahead 93-89 after three quarters and then on to victory.

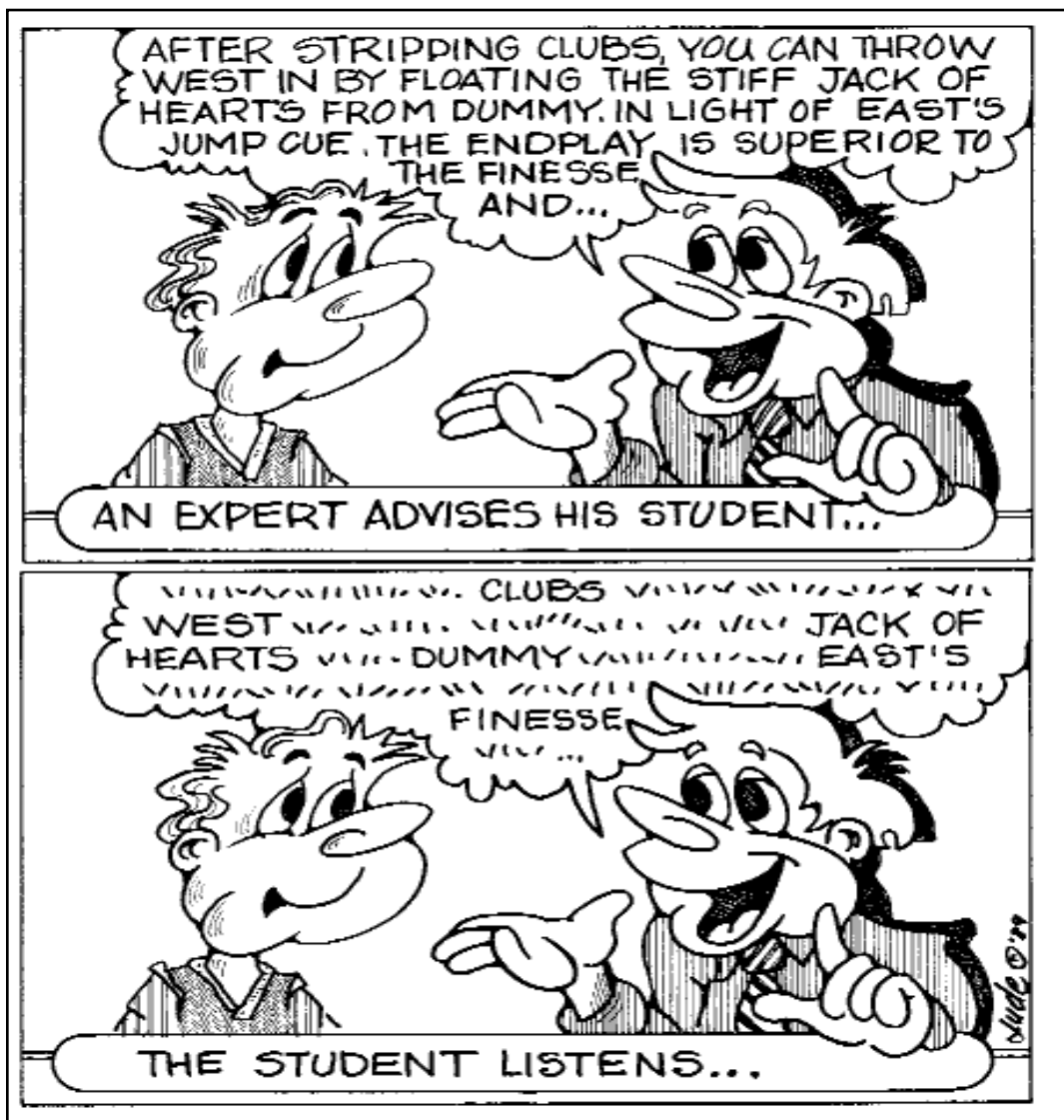

Thinking Bridge #9

West leads the ♣4. You (East) play the ♣K which holds the trick. How do you plan to defeat this contract?

The bidding is normal. North shows 9-14 high-card points and five hearts. South's final pass normally indicates a doubleton heart. There are some hands holding three hearts that should pass 3NT but the majority correct to 4♥. The defense should assume a doubleton heart unless opener thinks a long time before passing.

Also, South's 1NT opening is correct, the doubleton heart notwithstanding. If South opens 1♦ and hears the expected 1♥ response, what is he to rebid? The hand is much too strong to rebid 1NT or 2♦ and not strong enough to rebid 2NT.

South has "walled" himself in with the 1♦ opening. If the doubleton heart scares South, he should put a diamond honor in with his hearts and complain to partner that the lighting in the playing area is just terrible.

On to the defense: when your ♣K wins trick one, your proper return is the ♣7, the higher of your two remaining clubs. If you had three clubs remaining, you should return your lowest club. All this helps partner out tremendously.

Even more helpful is playing the ♥K (to alert

partner of your heart strength) before returning the ♣7. If partner wins the ♣7 and returns a heart, your side will collect the first five tricks.

If you return the ♣7 at trick two, neglecting to help partner out, you pay through the nose. Partner is almost sure to duck the second club, allowing you to keep a third club in case you have an early side-suit entry. If partner ducks the second club, declarer races off with nine tricks: five diamonds, three spades and one club. For shame.

Point to remember: Whenever you can help partner on defense, do so. A thoughtful defender makes for an appreciative partner.

The Bridge Trip

Gary King of Houston is a Silver Life Master who writes a column for 299er players in the Scorecard, the District 16 publication.

Over the years I have spent time talking with quite literally hundreds, if not thousands, of students about bridge. I talk with prospective players who are considering beginning lessons and with rabid duplicate addicts who are consumed with the game.

What strikes me as most interesting is how many things are reflected in this game that we play and love so much. In numerous ways, this game is like other sports and even like life itself.

Several years ago I received a telephone call from a previous student. She and her partner had a dispute about a particular hand and called so that I could mediate.

We discussed the auction and the hand (she was a GOOD student because she had the auction and complete hand written out including all passes, vulnerability, dealer and every hand which remarkably had 13 cards).

After a few minutes of discussion she sighed and with a little frustration said, "Do you ever think I will get this game?"

How would you answer that question? Have you ever felt that way?

My answer was very straightforward. I replied, "You are thinking about this game all wrong!"

There is no Utopia. There is no plateau at

which you arrive and realize that you know everything that you need to know. There is no heaven-like existence where you never make mistakes and can play with little or no effort.

You must realize — and learn — that the enjoyment of this game is the trip. Learn to enjoy your travels along the path to becoming an accomplished player. Enjoy the scenery, the people and the experience.

It is the trip that is the fun. Do not be like the vacationer who is in such a hurry to get to the final destination that he views the Grand Canyon from the car while passing by.

Stop and take in the enjoyment and pleasure that this game has to offer. Enjoy the game, enjoy the people, enjoy making good decisions, enjoy your wins and enjoy the wins of others.

If you recognize areas that need work (in your own game or in your partnership), make a brief note and discuss it later. During the play is generally not the time.

At the very least, wait until the round is over and you have stepped away from the table.

Try to locate a mentor. A mentor should be a player with greater experience and one to whom you have at least regular access (in person, by phone or e-mail). Use the mentor not to teach you but to help you and partner work out the root cause of problems in your bidding and play. With the root cause identified, you can then work on those skills on your own.

If you think about this game for a minute, it is beautiful in its simplicity. The laws of the game do not dictate how you and partner communicate. At any given time, the methods you choose to use are totally up to you. You can use whatever tools you think are in your best interest. It is this flexibility of design that keeps a player continuously striving to improve. It is also this simplicity that keeps providing greater and greater enjoyment from the play.
