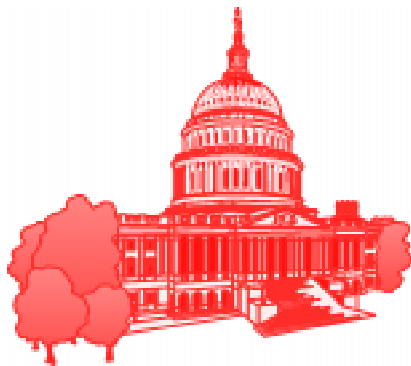

Einberg is Mini-Spingold I champ

The Einberg squad was solid throughout the event, losing only two quarters in six days of play.

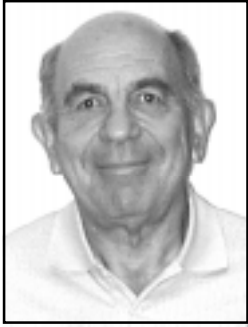

Why do players seek pro partners?

Zeke Jabbour offered four reasons why clients seek pros in an article that appeared in an earlier Daily Bulletin this week. That brings up the question, of course – why did Zeke's regular client, Michael Levine, decide to play with pros?



"I always had this fantasy," said Levine. "I fantasized that if I could put in enough time I could become as good as the best. I couldn't do much about this fantasy while I was working full-time, but I suddenly had the time when I turned 48.

"I knew I couldn't improve as fast as I wanted to playing with partners of approximately my ability. I had to play with good partners. How do you get a really good partner? You hire a pro. The die was cast.

"In Michigan the two best pros were Chuck Burger and Zeke Jabbour. I got together with Zeke and we went to Bermuda. I was feeling very good there – we were getting big scores and we were winning knockout matches. My castles started to tumble, though, when Zeke told me I had made 18 mistakes in a 26-board session. I realized I needed some lessons."

Zeke proceeded to give him some tips that we

all could use. Sit up straight. If you do something wrong, don't let the opponents know about it. Don't let a previous hand influence you in later play. "You have to look like a bridge player before you become one," Zeke told me.

Levine's work had begun. At first he looked for the easier regionals, but as the lessons began to make him more effective and more confident, he wanted to play more competitively. His partnership with Zeke got stronger and stronger, and they began winning even at the national level.

Of the eight senior national events they've entered, they've been victors in five. And they were second in the Senior World Championships in Albuquerque in 1994. He's going to try for the world championship again in the Senior Teams in Montreal next month. His team will have Allan Siebert, Arnie Fisher, Russ Arnold and Randy Pettit as well as Jabbour.

"I'm very glad I decided to take the pro route," said Levine. "Working with a pro gets you where you want to go much faster. Playing with a pro is way better than depending on the partnership desk."

He believes that chemistry has a lot to do with winning. "You have to play with partners and teammates who have personalities that you click with you. And of course the most important commandment is that you must believe in yourself."

With his solid eight-card suit Davis was unwilling to allow the opponents to declare a spade contract. The lengths to which he went to do this created a bizarre situation at the table. After reaching 3NT, the opponents persisted with 4♠. Not to be outdone, Davis bid 4NT. The opponents upped the ante by bidding 5♠ and Davis bid 5NT. Although neither side was entirely certain who was saving and who was bidding to make, East-West decided that they had heard enough so they doubled.

Since East-West are cold for 11 tricks in a spade contract (plus 450), Davis had already secured a good score for his side because the defense can only defeat the contract by two tricks (plus 300). What actually happened turned the good result into a top.

West began with the ♥A, and East played the 5. The ♥K was next (East played the 2). Since South had merely promised a club stopper in the auction, but not necessarily a heart stopper, West decided that East's echo in hearts was attitude. East, of course, thought she was merely giving count.

West continued with a third round of hearts and declarer, Hayman, spread her hand. 5NT doubled, making five, plus 670.

Transfer doubles?

John Potter was helping his daughter to learn bridge. He advised her to learn Jacoby Transfers and Negative Doubles so she could play in the 0-5 games. She got a book and studied. Then she went to her father and said, "This Jacoby Transfer stuff is ridiculous. Why should you have to go to three level when you have a weak minor?"

Her dad asked her how she'd handle it. "Easy. After my partner opens 1NT, I double, asking him to bid 2♣. Then I can pass or correct, depending on which minor I have."

"Great idea," said Potter. "The only problem is that there's a rule against doubling your partner."

"No there isn't. I've done it. When my partner opened 1♠ and I was short of spades, I doubled her, and she bid a different suit."

It seems the opponents didn't know any better, so they accepted the unusual double.

Running clubs – twice!

Declarer was playing in a notrump game, and she ran dummy's clubs, pitching losers from her hand. Then she crossed to her hand and ran five more clubs. Yes, it was in the 0-5 game. As declarer ran the second set of clubs, her partner said, "That club suit worked really well for you, didn't it?"

Tips for New Duplicate Players

Susan Freeman, who teaches bridge at the Miami Valley Bridge Center in Dayton OH, prepared these tips for her players who are new to duplicate:

- Count cards face down before sorting to make sure all hands have 13 cards.
- Recount after sorting to make sure no card is hidden.
- Decide your bid before you touch the bid box so you don't give extra information.
- Place bidding cards sequentially on the table so all bids can be seen and reviewed.
- Bid in tempo to avoid giving information, which may result in partner being banned from further bidding.
- Ask about opponent's bids only when it is your turn to bid.
- Direct questions to bidder's partner.
- For first lead, place your card face down on the table and ask your partner if there are any ques-

tions. This will avoid leading out of turn or being influenced by partner's question.

- Play each card in tempo to avoid giving extra information to your opponent or your partner.
- Call the director of the game if there is any question about any part of the game and let him or her make any decisions or rulings. The directors are there to help.
- Arrive early when playing with a new partner to decide partnership agreements and fill out a convention card.
- Be sure your convention card is complete, available and visible during the game.

Lynn Deas had only 10 high-card points, but she always likes hands with 6-4 distributions. Beth Palmer responded in hearts, and Lynn showed her good fit by leaping to three, despite her lack of high cards. Of course Palmer bid the game.

With hearts breaking and with the ♣K onside, Palmer made her game with an overtrick, losing only the two aces.

This was the bidding at the other table:

West took exactly eight tricks for plus 110, which meant 13 IMPs to Bjerkan since Palmer scored 650 for making 5♥.

The Bjerkan team gained another 9 IMPs two boards earlier, again because of an opening bid.

Palmer decided that the South hand called for a preemptive bid and opened 4♥. Everyone passed. She lost five tricks, but that obviously was a good save since East-West could make a spade game despite the atrocious spade split. Perhaps West should have come in with 4♠, but that could have been very wrong on a different lie of the cards.

At the other table, it went this way:

Certainly opening this hand with a one-bid is reasonable. But it didn't work out well this time. West was able to use Michaels, so East-West easily found their spade fit. South wasn't willing to let the opponents play spades, so she went on to 5♥. This was doubled and beaten three tricks – 9 IMPs to Bjerkan.

In the third quarter, Deas and Palmer had a very complicated relay auction. Deas, through a series of asking bids, discovered that her side had all the necessary controls, so they got to a cold grand slam that was missed at the other table. This was the deal:

Players' kids enjoy a sleepover

If you happened to drop by Room 8209 last night, you would have seen 25 youngsters having a sleepover. The group consisted of some of the older youngsters who are in the tournament child care program. Altogether Donna Compton of Dallas and her crew have been taking care of 64 kids this week.

The kids were very excited about staying together all night long. They've already let it be known to their parents that they'd rather be with their friends than with them.

The youngsters have had a busy week – field trips galore. They've been to the Air and Space Museum, the Zoo, the Museum of Natural Science, the Children's Museum, the Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial, the Museum of American History and the Aquarium. They also play soccer and go swimming every day. And don't forget that pizza party Thursday evening. Life's a ball!

The children range in age from five months to 10 years. This is the 15th time there has been a child care program at an NABC. After she had children, Compton still wanted to play bridge, so she brought them to tournaments and hired baby sitters. Sometimes others joined in with her, and the child care program idea was born. During the recent Boston NABC, she asked the Board of Directors to make child care a part of the NABC program, and they approved the idea. The ACBL supplied a tour bus this week so the kids could do all their sightseeing.

It's reached the point where the kids are more excited about going to an NABC than their parents. Between tournaments the youngsters e-mail each other back and forth. Lots of parents agree that they wouldn't be able to come to NABCs if it weren't for the child care program.

The child center opens every day at noon and proceeds through an afternoon session, a dinner session, and evening session and an after-hours session that ends at 2 a.m. In other words, it's open 14 hours a day. Lots of the kids stay for the dinner session – they'd rather eat with their friends than their parents. "Sometimes the parents feel abandoned," laughed Compton.

Compton needs a good-sized staff to handle so many youngsters. Working with her are Debra Marsh, Dallas; Sky Cappelletti, New York City; Katie Stevens, Houston; Rhiannon Breed, Austin and Alison Rogers, Memphis.

In addition there are three junior sitters – they're too old for child care but too young to be senior sitters. They are Alison Cappelletti, Katie Klein and Alison Klein.

Hope you were quiet when you went by Room 8209 last night. There were 25 kids sleeping in there.

A few laughs

Just sit there?

When Ralph Hirshberg was reprimanded for giving hints to declarer as dummy, he was aghast. "What am I supposed to do when I'm dummy -- just sit there?"

"Like my floor directors!"

A player was telling a story about how a hand was bid. "He had ace-king fourth in spades and ace-king sixth in clubs and something -- well, his red cards didn't matter. He opens a club and it goes pass-pass-something and he bids a spade. It went two hearts and it went four spades or something. I don't remember the exact auction, but it went round and round and when it . . ."

At this point Harry Goldwater broke in to say, "You sound like one of my floor directors."

"Where are my cards?"

It happened at a sectional tournament in Seekonk MA. A furious thunderstorm was raking the area, and suddenly part of the hotel's roof gave way and the players were deluged. Fortunately it was a very large playing area, and everyone pitched in to move the tables and chairs and supplies into the dry part of the convention center. Moments later the storm was forgotten and everyone was playing bridge -- except one table.

"I can't find my cards. I was in the middle of playing a hand and now I can't find my cards." A major search took place -- no luck. Then one of the players started to laugh and pointed to the player's feet. There, tucked in his socks, were seven cards. That's where he put them when the deluge began.

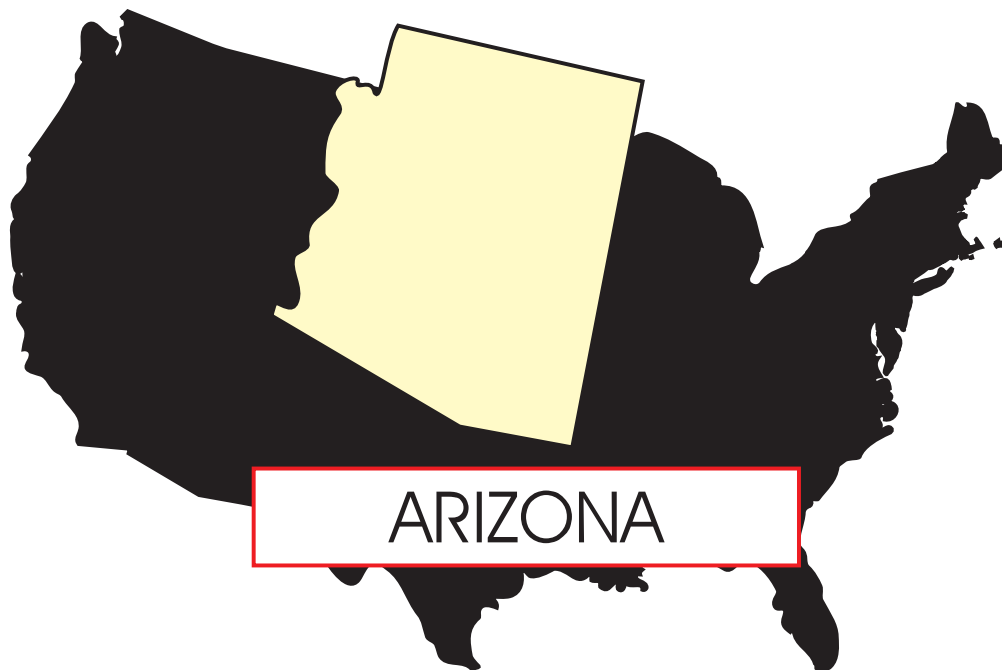
